As of March 2024, there are no formal state licensure requirements for Registered Health Information Technicians (RHITs). Davidson-Davie Community College's HIT program is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation for Health Informatics and Information Management Education (CAHIIM), which is a requirement for sitting for the certification exam. Passing the RHIT exam leads to national certification which is recognized in all states. Therefore, it has been determined that the program meets the certification requirements for all states.

All certified RHITs must maintain their [American Health Information Management Association \(AHIMA\) credential](#) by completing 20 qualifying continuing education units (CEUs) every two years. American Health Information Management Association (AHIMA) certification is the sought-after industry-standard most employers look for when hiring registered health information technicians.
