Wisdom Writing Ruth 1:1-18

In the days when the judges ruled, there was a famine in the land, and a certain man of Bethlehem in Judah went to live in the country of Moab, he and his wife and two sons.

²The name of the man was Elimelech and the name of his wife Naomi, and the names of his two sons were Mahlon and Chilion; they were Ephrathites from Bethlehem in Judah.

They went into the country of Moab and remained there.

³But Elimelech, the husband of Naomi, died,
and she was left with her two sons.

⁴These took Moabite wives;
the name of one was Orpah
and the name of the other Ruth.

When they had lived there for about ten years,

5both Mahlon and Chilion also died,
so that the woman was left
without her two sons or her husband.

6 Then she started to return
with her daughters-in-law
from the country of Moab,
for she had heard in the country of Moab
that the LORD had had consideration for his people
and given them food.

⁷So she set out from the place where she had been living, she and her two daughters-in-law, and they went on their way to go back to the land of Judah.

⁸But Naomi said to her two daughters-in-law, 'Go back each of you to your mother's house. May the LORD deal kindly with you, as you have dealt with the dead and with me.

⁹The Lord grant that you may find security, each of you in the house of your husband.'

Then she kissed them, and they wept aloud.

¹⁰They said to her, 'No, we will return with you to your people.'

¹¹But Naomi said, 'Turn back, my daughters, why will you go with me? Do I still have sons in my womb that they may become your husbands?

¹²Turn back, my daughters, go your way, for I am too old to have a husband.

Even if I thought there was hope for me, even if I should have a husband tonight and bear sons, "would you then wait until they were grown? Would you then refrain from marrying?

No, my daughters, it has been far more bitter for me than for you, because the hand of the LORD has turned against me.'

¹⁴Then they wept aloud again. Orpah kissed her mother-in-law, but Ruth clung to her.

16 But Ruth said,

'Do not press me to leave you
or to turn back from following you!

Where you go,

I will go;

where you lodge,

I will lodge;

your people
shall be my people,
and your God
my God.

¹⁷ Where you die, I will die there will I be buried.

May the LORD
do thus and so
to me,
and more as well,
if even death
parts me from you!'

¹⁸When Naomi saw that she was determined to go with her, she said no more to her.

Epistle Hebrews 9:11-14

11 But when Christ came as a high priest of the good things that have come,

then through the greater and perfect tent (not made with hands, that is, not of this creation),

12he entered
once for all
into the Holy Place,
not with the blood of goats and calves,
but with his own blood,
thus obtaining eternal redemption.

¹³For if the blood of goats and bulls, with the sprinkling of the ashes of a heifer, sanctifies those who have been defiled so that their flesh is purified,

will the blood of Christ,
who through the eternal Spirit
offered himself
without blemish
to God,
purify our conscience
from dead works
to worship the living God!

Gospel Mark 12:28-34

28 One of the scribes came near and heard them disputing with one another, and seeing that he answered them well, he asked him, 'Which commandment is the first of all?'

²⁹Jesus answered, 'The first is, "Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one;

30you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength."

³¹The second is this, "You shall love your neighbour as yourself."

There is no other commandment greater than these.'

³⁴When Jesus saw that he answered wisely, he said to him, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' After that no one dared to ask him any question.

We're back to Wisdom,
On this second week of my holiday

The story carries itself –
Tempting us with an air of universality
But imagine reading from within a tribal identity,
