Fine Motor Skills
Classroom Strategies
If you need a student to develop a more firm grip, use clay instead of playdough
Have clothes (jackets, shoes, etc) in a center for them to practice snapping, zipping, etc.
Place stickers on the right part of the scissors that should be up in order to give them a guide as to how to hold them.
Puzzles also help with fine motor as well as hand eye coordination
'Sewing' by using a shoestring and an object with holes. Such as a cardboard shape of an animal with holes around the border where they have to 'sew' the border.

Picture instructions
"Don't Bug Me" Hat - glue plastic bugs to a hat and wear the hat during small group as a signal to students to find a friend instead of "bugging" the teacher
Visuals of the steps to a task that needs to be done. Using pictures of the children actually doing the steps for something that happens everyday (washing hands, etc.) is a great activity as well! They love getting to see themselves around the class.

Focus
Classroom Strategies
An example I've recently heard of for short focus and physical movement is yoga. If you have them do a pose, such as 'tree', they have to focus on something stable in the classroom or else they will fall. Challenge them to stay up longer and longer.

Cooperative Play
Classroom Strategies
Establish and assign roles within groups so that students all have a job and the jobs rotate the next time they are in groups.
Use puppets to help them practice and see collaborative skills, such as sharing. Can give them a scenario for the puppets and have them practice sharing a toy both puppets want to play with.
Similar to collaborative art pieces, can also do collaborative writing (verbal or actual writing) where each child provides a sentence for the story. Allows them to be really silly while working together to create an understandable story. Includes literacy cross-over!

Social Problem Solving
Classroom Strategies
Use scenarios that have actually come up in your class to act out with puppets
When reading a story, give the students a visual when you hear or see a source of conflict. Example. Give students a paper heart or have them make their own paper heart. The specific book I have used is Chrysanthemum, each time you hear someone say something negative, you tear off a piece of the heart. At the end of the story, you ask the students to put the heart back together. While they can piece it back together, there are some last effects that can't be erased, even though it is put back together. Talk through how words hurt and we often struggle after someone has said hurtful things.

## **Relationship Building**

#### **Classroom Strategies**

2x10 - 2 quality minutes for 10 days in a row with a specific student to build a stronger relationship

Sit with students at lunch or make an agenda for play dates on the playground

Personalized greetings at the door - students get to pick their greeting

Using flex time in the morning where they can write and draw, and then share during morning meeting

Allow students to bring things to share about themselves, like pictures of their family or their pets to hang up, create an 'About Me' poster

Show N Tell holds a large value in them being able to express who they are

Acting silly! My co-teacher at one time dressed up as a shark for an activity we were doing. The kids loved it and talked about it for the rest of the year.

Home visits, even if you just stay outside!

Drawing/ writing little notes and popping them in their mailbox to recognize how special they are. Also, making notes for them when they are sick to let them know they are missed.
