

Tips for Reading Research Articles

Start by taking extensive notes on the pieces of each article that are relevant to your research.

You may be able to pull information from the data collection, methodology and analysis sections of these articles for your own studies.

Consider the following:

1. What issue or question is the author trying to address?
2. What type of research design was implemented?
3. How many participants were in the study?
4. What kind of data was collected? How was the data analyzed?
5. Was there/ what was the intervention of research move?
6. What are the findings?
7. What are the implications for your research?

Consider the author's argument and data, as well as research method and writing style, to get to know the context of your topic and provide even more models for writing up classroom research

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
