Design Features of the MCIEA Rubric

- 1. The MCIEA rubric includes **only the standards and/or skills that are being assessed** in the task. Additional categories that are not rooted in assessed standards or skills should not be included.
- 2. Rubric cells are intentionally left blank. Rather than spending time on writing descriptors for each cell, these rubrics encourage teachers to spend time on **providing personalized feedback**.
- 3. The template does not include letters or numbers in order to accommodate different grading practices across schools. Teachers and administration should **discuss the best column headers for their school or department**.
 - Example column headers could include the following:
 - Exceeding, Meeting, Almost There, Not There Yet
 - Exceeding/Meeting, Almost There, Not There Yet, Beginning
 - Met Independently, Met With Support, Progressed With Support, Has Not Progressed
 - **95+**, 85, 75, 65
