11B 3.5 Academic Match

PHASE OVERVIEW

Pairs will identify the key components of match and fit so that they can research and select post-secondary pathways that are strong options for the mentee. An emphasis will be placed on academic match to ensure that students are not under-matching. Pairs will work together to create a list of 5-10 post-secondary options.



LESSON OBJECTIVE

SWBAT define the terms "safety," "target," "reach," and "undermatching" in relation to post-secondary programs.

PURPOSE

As students engage in the post-secondary search process, they may tend to either "dream big" or play it safe. According to the College Board, first-generation students are more likely to "undermatch." This lesson pushes all students to both "dream big" and play it safe, in addition to finding schools that are in the middle of those two extremes.

FACILITATOR NOTES:

Overview:

This week in class, students reviewed the importance of applying to target, safety and reach schools.

- Safety schools are schools in which your mentee's GPA & SAT score are above the college's average.
- Target schools are schools in which your mentee's GPA & SAT score fall within the college's average.
- Reach schools are schools in which your mentee's GPA and SAT score are below the college's average.

We use the <u>selectivity chart</u> to determine students' reach, target and safety bands. All colleges will fall into one of these bands. Your mentee should have shared their safety, target and reach bands in this week's lesson.

In your response:

1. Share your high point and low point for the week.


2. Research and suggest at least one target college for your mentee.

Use the website <u>Big Future</u> to research. The filters, located at the top of the Big Future webpage, will allow you to find schools that meet your mentee's needs.

You should filter by your mentee's fit factors and target selectivity band (go to the "admissions" button to filter by selectivity band). If your mentee has not shared their target selectivity band, click on the "less selective" filter.

Make sure to include:

- The name of the option
- How it connects to their academic match (we recommend suggesting a target school)
- How it connects to your mentee's fit factors
- Something interesting about the option



Special notes on college research:

- 1. The financial fit tool on Big Future is not accurate. If your mentee is worried about affording college, you should primarily be recommending community colleges and 4 year in-state, state school.
- 2. If your mentee's target selectivity band is "very selective," suggest a school from this Very Selective Colleges Guide as opposed to using Big Future.
