

# School Annual Education Report (AER) Cover Letter West Ottawa High School

Dear Parents and Community Members:

We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER), which provides key information on the 2022-23 educational progress for West Ottawa High School. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and state laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, accountability, and teacher quality. For the 2023-24 school year, schools were identified based on previous years' performance using definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that had at least one underperforming student subgroup in 2022-23. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that had a student subgroup performing at the same level as the lowest 5% of all schools in the state in 2021-22. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance was in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state or had a graduation rate at or below 67% in 2021-22. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no label is given.

Our school was not identified for improvement and has not been given one of these labels.

West Ottawa High School is a comprehensive high school serving students in grades 9-12. WOHS is also recognized as an International Baccalaureate World School. The IB program offers students the opportunity to earn an International Baccalaureate diploma. West Ottawa High School offers nearly 200 courses ranging from International Baccalaureate (IB), Advanced Placement (AP), advanced courses, blended courses, and academic intervention classes.

In addition to our core programs, West Ottawa High School has implemented intervention programs for incoming freshmen and continues to have intervention programs for the upperclassmen. These programs include:

- WO Prep (Small communities model targeting most at-risk freshmen)
- Odysseyware online credit recovery courses
- English Language intervention classes
- Seminar (Advisory)
- Basic needs financial support through our internal When In Need WO charity Extracurricular financial support through The Panther Fund
- WO Access- After school peer tutoring programs

State law requires that we also report additional information.

### 1. Process for Assigning Students

West Ottawa High School is unique in that it consists of two 9-12 high school buildings on one campus. Students are assigned to West Ottawa High School buildings (North or South) based on their designated middle school assignment. Macatawa Bay students are assigned to the south building. Harbor Lights students are assigned to the north building. Core classes are taught in each building, however students may move between buildings for elective or specialized courses. #### 3. Our Core Curriculum

At the present time, ELA, Mathematics, and Science are implementing the Michigan State Standards. Core curriculum is implemented daily through the use of research based instructional materials and strategies.

When designing lessons and common assessments, West Ottawa High School core areas align their courses with the Michigan State Standards, and elective departments have focused on the <u>Literacy Standards</u> in Science, Social Studies and Technical Subjects. The Michigan High School Content Expectations are also used and considered in curricular decisions. All departments have developed Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) to develop, implement, and reflect on common assessments and student achievement based on the State of Michigan Standards.

#### 5. Parent/Teacher Conferences

The last five years of Parent Teacher Conference data shows that on average approximately 4,000 individual Parent Teacher Conferences have occurred in our Fall Conferences, and 3,000 at our Spring Conferences. 




During the 2022-23 school year there were 508 students enrolled in 28 Advanced Placement Courses. There were 634 AP exams administered to 379 students. This means that 60% of AP students took at least one College Board exam.



As part of our efforts to promote a college-going culture at WOHS, we have been striving to the same time we have increased Economically Disadvantaged enrollment from 7% to 30% of total AP enrollment.




In 2022-23 there were 195 students enrolled in International Baccalaureate courses. Since the inception of the IB Diploma Program in 2011, WOHS has experienced a significant increase in students enrolled in IB classes, as well as the representation of students from subgroups.



# d. <u>THE NUMBER AND PERCENTAGE OF STUDENTS RECEIVING A SCORE LEADING TO COLLEGE</u> CREDIT

In 2022-23, 72% of students who took exams earned college credit. AP scores from WOHS students were sent to 80 different colleges and universities around the nation and the world.

#### **Graduation Rates**

Consistent focus and hard work by West Ottawa High School faculty to build a college-going culture is paying off in rising graduation rates across all subgroups of students. The Center for Educational Performance and Information (CEPI) and Michigan Department of Education recently released graduation rate data for the Class of 2023 and West Ottawa High School was pleased to confirm that 93% of students in the Class of 2023 graduated on time in four years. The overall 4-year graduation rate for West Ottawa High School has increased from 80% in 2011 to 93% in 2023.

#### **Additional Points of Pride About Our School**

Students in Art, Music, Business, Industrial Arts, Foreign Language and Physical Wellness have been recognized throughout the region, state and national level for their student work or performances. West Ottawa High School has been ranked by U.S. News and World Report as a Best High Schools- Silver Award Winner for 8 consecutive years. The ranking compares over 800 public high schools across the state. WOHS is ranked in the top 5% of high schools in Michigan. Rankings are based on enrollment, school demographics, enrollment in Advanced Placement (AP) and/or International Baccalaureate (IB) courses and the percentage of students passing these College Board exams.
