LINEUP FOR THE 16th OPEN HOUSE CHICAGO® FESTIVAL,
FEATURING MORE THAN 200 LOCATIONS, FREE AND OPEN TO THE PUBLIC,
OCTOBER 17 AND 18, 2026

*The Annual Public Festival, One of the Largest of its Kind in the World, Provides Free Access
to Architecturally, Historically and Culturally Significant Sites Across 30 Diverse Chicago
Neighborhoods, Including 20 Sites That Are All New to the Festival in 2026*

CHICAGO, September 9, 2026 — The Chicago Architecture Center (CAC), celebrating its 60th anniversary in 2026, announces the 200+ sites for the 16th Open House Chicago® festival, taking place across 30 Chicago neighborhoods, Saturday and Sunday, October 17-18, 2026. Open House Chicago® (OHC), one of the largest architecture and urban exploration festivals in the world, is a free annual festival that provides behind-the-scenes access to places of architectural, historical and cultural significance. No advance registration is required to participate; visitors simply choose their sites and show up during daily Open House hours. Plan your itinerary at openhousechicago.org.

Every October, Open House Chicago® attracts more than 35,000 visitors from across the region and around the U.S., for special free access to lofty skyscraper rooftops and penthouses, historic landmarks, breweries and distilleries, houses of worship, innovative workspaces, schools and greenspaces, many that are seldom open to the public, while highlighting businesses, organizations and creative leaders making a positive impact. This year, OHC will feature more than 200 locations across 30 Chicago neighborhoods, including 20 sites that are all new to the festival, and debut the new Built on Belief initiative.

"Open House Chicago® is a chance to discover our city's historic and contemporary architecture with an unprecedented level of access," said Eleanor Esser Gorski, President &

CEO of the Chicago Architecture Center. "We hope that attendees strengthen their relationships with architectural spaces in their own neighborhoods, while also exploring diverse communities across the city and gaining confidence to participate more fully in conversations around architecture, design and civic life."

Twenty sites making their Open House Chicago® debut in 2026 include: the Chicago Fire FC's Dear Chicago Experience Center in the Wrigley Building; Muddy Waters MOJO Museum inside the restored Kenwood residence of the Father of Chicago Blues; Smashed Plastic Record Pressing, a vinyl LP pressing plant located in the former Hammond Organ factory in Hermosa; the Studio Gang-designed Chinese American Service League Kam Liu Building in Chinatown; and the Revival-style Women's Athletic Club on the Near North Side, home of the first athletic club for women in the United States. Debuting this year during Open House Chicago® weekend is CAC's Built on Belief program, exploring the intersections of architecture, religion and spirituality. Three sites in the Woodlawn neighborhood — the Narrow Bridge Arts Club, First Presbyterian Church of Chicago and Oak Woods Cemetery — will co-create site-specific exhibitions and programs for the festival. Together, these three locations tell a story of how this South Side neighborhood has been shaped by different faith communities and sacred sites over generations. Built on Belief is made possible by a grant from Lilly Endowment Inc. through its Religion and Cultural Institutions Initiative.

In addition to the new sites and programs, some greatest OHC hits return this year after taking a break, including: House of Blues, part of Bertrand Goldberg's Marina City; The Plant in Back of the Yards; Adler & Sullivan's 1889 Auditorium Theater in the Loop; Center for Native Futures in the Marquette Building; the Jazz Age Park Castle Condominiums in Rogers Park; the historic Al-Sadiq Mosque in Bronzeville; the hidden, private Birch Road Clubhouse in Lincoln Park; and Chinatown's iconic Pui Tak Center. CTA Transit Plan

OHC encourages festivalgoers to utilize public transportation to access the 200+ OHC sites. The Chicago Transit Authority, which operates the City's train and bus system, is a sponsor of the event; routes between sites via bus and train can be mapped through the OHC website.
