- These projects are particularly important to have a multi-stakeholder vision process
- How can we make sure the community stakeholders have a voice in the process?
- Participant interest in this work:
  - Housing
  - Many coal-fired power plants and open coal ash ponds; looking to redevelop and involve/engage community
  - Coal reclamation, impact of open pit strip mining
  - Job loss in community, better address the issue through the Building Resilience Economies in Coal Communities
  - Keeping rails open to help with economic development
  - Southern WV Coal impacted communities figure out what they want to do with coal impacted communities (community coaching)
  - Community Based groups/Task Force in Indiana County building resiliency with the prospect that coal-fired power plants would eventually closed, identity assets, challenges, opportunities for community engagement and sustainability
  - Better understand community needs
  - How the transition to renewable energy and green manufacturing can build wealth in communities that lack wealth for historical reasons
  - Community Land Trusts, alternative land tenure arrangement (as opposed to private property arrangements)
  - Community participation and control that builds the economy in a sustainable way
  - Fair Shake Environmental Legal Services support communities in creating shared vision; think about visioning from a legal perspective, bring people in who are often left out of these community visioning conversations
  - Brownfield site, mixed-use development
  - Legal protections and precedents for CBAs, especially for projects getting Federal Tax Credits

- Discussion Questions:
  - 1) How do we resource communities to do this work? Developers have money and other organizations have resources - how to get communities involved when resources are sparse?
    - a) Create basic plans: Community Development Plan *separate* from Economic Development Plan; public vs. private
      - i) The two work together but are different
    - National Philanthropic Organizations seeking to fund community coalitions that would play a Community Benefits negotiation role. And local foundations on a smaller scale.
      Certainly inadequate and could be scaled up
      - i) Dream.org
      - ii) Heartland Fund
      - iii) Just Transition Fund
    - c) Financial Resources for smaller villages that are coal impacted are often unavailable needs to be a way to financially support the planning process
    - d) Fair Shake provides pro-bono and sliding-fee-scale legal representation in PA, OH & WV, including representing community coalitions in Community Benefits negotiations. Feel free to reach out if anyone wants to chat more mniebler@fairshake-els.org
    - e) Many different resources and funds for a lot of different things important to understand specific terminology:
      - i) Newer terminology, typically tied to a private sector project (ex. Battery manufacturer looking for DOE funding, DOE requires Battery manufacturer must have CBP):
        - (1) Community Benefit Plan (CBP)
        - (2) Community Benefit Agreement (CBA)
        - (3) Examples can be found here and here
      - ii) Every region *should* be doing, and if not should start, public:
        - (1) Community Development Plan
        - (2) Economic Development Plan
    - f) Important to create coalitions to help inform what community agreements are wanted from the private entity for CBP
    - g) Relmagine Appalachia has a listserv for grant opportunities (there are grants for writing grants!) sign up here.
    - h) Gap between type of community organization we need and the type of community funding the government wants to see

- i) Connect ecosystems to people looking for information within the ecosystems, covers policy work, nonprofit sector, private sector trying to figure out how to address the issues
- j) Working together to create support resources/template that fit Federal funding requirements
- k) Mostly top-down funding, where do you see the typical economic development and organizations (LDDS, Chambers, etc.) role being in this work?
  - i) ReImagine Appalachia has been reaching out to LDDs in coal communities, mid-success but need to keep pushing to try and find an in to connect with resources
  - ii) Can be hard to "sell" the idea of Community Benefits
- Energy Resilience starting from the recognition that the renewable energy technology are completely scalable, need to enable this scaling
