Caught Practicing Virtue cards will be given when students exemplify virtues. These cards will list the virtue a student has modeled with a brief explanation. This will promote continued virtues, students as role models, and also give praise to our Lord Jesus Chirst.

A Christian Witness certificate will be awarded to students who practice consistent virtues. These may be given to students from the Principal, Teachers, Teacher aids, Lunch Ladies, and other school staff members.

Discipline

Classroom discipline will be based on the Education in Virtue program that we have been utilizing for the past few years with our Virtue of the Week. The Education in Virtue program was created by the Dominican Sisters of Mary, Mother of the Eucharist.

The policies are based on the following premise: Discipline always starts with teaching, prompting, and acknowledging positive behavior.

The Virtues program will:

- Increase consistency across classrooms
- Make school a predictable, consistent, positive environment for students
- Have positive school-wide implications
- Allow students to develop Christian attitudes

Negative consequences will be used to achieve the following

- Prevent problem behavior from being rewarded
- Prevent problem behavior form escalating
- Prevent problem behavior from disrupting instruction from others
- Provide teaching opportunities

Conduct and Effort grades will be shown in FACTS so that parents can track changes over the course of the quarter. Conduct and effort grades are part of the Archdiocese of Detroit report card and are counted towards honor roll status. As we strive to mold young Christians, we are tasked with shaping and developing the whole child. Think sheets are designed to help students reflect on their choices and consider ways to make better choices in the future. All detentions (and more serious consequences) will be processed through the main office.

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DRESS CODE

The school uniform is a symbol of a student's pride in him/herself and the school. By enrolling in St. Joseph Catholic School, parents and students have entered into an implied contract with the school. The school will educate the enrolled students so long as the students and parents abide by the school's standards and policies. Students are to be in full uniform unless they have a signed, dated note from their parents (which will apply for that day only) stating the reason for being out of uniform. A note will only be accepted by the school as an excuse for being out of dress code for one item at a time, and for no longer than one week (5 days) for the entire school year.

DRESS CODE VIOLATIONS

Students who do not comply with the dress code policy will be given Dress Code Violation Slips.

Dress code violations:

- 1. Written warning.
- 2. Parents called to bring correct clothing; \$1.00 fine that will be given to the Missions.
- 3. Parents called to bring correct clothing; Student may not participate in the next Jean Day.
- 4. Parents called to bring correct clothing; conference with principal; in-school suspension the rest of the day.

The student and parent/guardian must sign the Dress Code Violation Slips. The written warnings will be returned to school and kept on file. Subsequent violations will result in a conference between the student, parents and principal as to the commitment of the family to the school.

DISCIPLE OF CHRIST VIRTUES

"If faith is like the root, charity is like the sap that nourishes the trunk and rises into the branches, the network of virtues, to produce the delicious fruit of good works." (Servais Pinckaers, O.P., Morality: The Catholic View, South Bend, St. Augustine Press, 2001)

Disciple of Christ Virtues guides educators, parents, and students in identifying virtues which need to be cultivated. Each corresponding "Opposing Trait" highlights a pattern of behavior which needs change in order for one to mature in virtue.

Human virtues acquired by education, by deliberate acts, and by perseverance ever-renewed in repeated efforts are purified and elevated by divine grace.

With God's help, they forge character and give facility in the practice of the good. The virtuous man is happy to practice them (CGC, 1810).

Cell Phone / Smart Watch Policy

It is strongly recommended that students do not bring cell phones or smart watches to school. Those that choose to bring their device are to keep them OFF and in their backpack at all times.

Homework

The administration and staff of St. Joseph School reaffirm the necessity and value of homework. Research has proven that homework assignments strengthen skills already learned in classroom instruction and also assist students in developing study skills that are essential for continued success in learning. Failure to complete homework assignments seriously impacts a student's level of achievement and hinders one's growth in personal responsibility. The homework policy that follows aims to promote excellence and the total growth of each student enrolled at St. Joseph School.

<u>Frequency:</u> Students can expect homework daily depending on grade level.

<u>Length:</u> Students can expect approximately one to one and one half hours of homework daily. At times, assigned projects or reports will require additional time.

Quality of Work: Students are expected to complete assigned work as directed. All work is to be: complete, neat, as accurate as possible, and on time. If not done to specifications, the work will be redone until it is acceptable by the teacher.

<u>Late Assignments:</u> Assignments, which are not submitted when asked for, are considered LATE.

- 10% will be deducted if late but handed in the next day.
- 20% total will be deducted if two days late
- 30% total will be deducted if three days late
- 0% will be given if the assignment is four or more days late.

Late Assignments Due to Absence:

Students will have one day for each day absent to make up assignments that are missed due to absences or illness. NOTE: parents are asked to pick up or make other arrangements for these assignments to be picked up when a student is ill. After a student returns to school, he/she must see the teachers about any additional work, tests, etc. No work will be accepted unless a note from the parent is provided that states the reason for absence.

Format for Assignments:

- All papers for all teachers are to be headed in this way in the top left margin of loose-leaf papers:
 - First and Last Names
 - Date
 - Subject of pages
- Only loose-leaf paper may be used for assignments. No spiral paper may be used for assignments.
- Math work is to be done only in pencil.
- Blue or black ink is to be used for all other assignments
- Red pens are to be used for grading work.
- No drawings or scribbles on papers will be acceptable.

Honors and Awards

Students may earn honors each quarter based on grades and conduct.

- First honors are given for all A's in all subjects and Conduct with Marks of Satisfactory in Effort, Computer, Physical Education, Music, and Art.
- Second honors are given for A's and B's in all subjects and Conduct with Marks of Satisfactory in Effort, Computer, Physical Education, Music, and Art.
- Third honors are given to those students who have A's and B's in Conduct, no D's, F's or marks of Unsatisfactory in other areas on the report card.
- Awards are given for perfect attendance during the quarter. This includes no tardiness.

• Students receiving First Honors all four quarters of the year will receive an award at the end of the year.

Teacher Assist

Personalized learning and support includes 20-30 minutes during each school day for our 7th and 8th grade students.

Friday Folder

Students will receive all graded assignments and completed work on Friday to assemble into a pack to be taken home. This folder is to be returned to the homeroom teacher the next school day.

Sports

St. Joseph School offers a variety of sports for students in grades 5 to 8. Girls may participate in volleyball, soccer, basketball, and softball. Boys may participate in soccer, basketball, and baseball.

Continued participation in sports is contingent upon good grades and conduct. A student must maintain a 2.0 Grade Point Average to participate in a given sport. Conduct must be satisfactory (85% or higher) at all times. Students who are ineligible will be evaluated each week until the grades and conduct are acceptable to participate again in sports.

Any student receiving an F (69% or lower) grade in Religion, Math, English, Reading, Science, Social Studies, Health, or Spelling/Vocabulary will be ineligible to participate in practice and games for one week from Monday to Monday.

Standardized Testing

STAR Testing for all grades will take place three times a year. Students will be tested in math, reading and early literacy. Teachers will analyze the results to inform their curriculum planning. Summary reports on individual student progress will be sent home to parents.

High School Information

High School Placement Tests

8th graders planning to attend a Catholic high school in Michigan or Ohio will have to take a placement test. St. Mary Catholic Central gives this test in November and Catholic High Schools in Toledo give their test in February. You will be notified about the specific dates in plenty of time.

Topics on the placement tests:

- Vocabulary: analogies, definitions
- Math: sequences, geometry, fractions, powers, angles, square root, greater than, less than, rounding, percent, equations, problem solving, greatest common factor, least common multiple, measurement-English and Metric, graphs, proportions, area, circles, integers, decimals, etc.
- Language: punctuation, capitalization, subject/verb agreement in sentences, paragraphs, topic sentences, friendly letters, business letters, simple, compound, and complex sentences, spelling, grammar, and being able to write paragraphs and essay question answers.
- Reading: be able to comprehend what is read and answer questions, draw inferences, draw conclusions, describe character, plot, and timeline. All these topics are studied in the grades. Science and Social Studies are tested in the area of reading.

The principal has the right to make changes to the handbook as necessary. Parents will receive timely notification of any changes.

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Chromebook Student Expectations

In signing the Technology User Agreement located in the student handbook, you committed to follow all user guidelines and student expectations, understanding that violating these guidelines and expectations may result in disciplinary action *and/or* restrictions with use of your Chromebook.

As a learner:

- 1. I will be responsible for my Chromebook at all times.
 - My Chromebook will never be left unattended.
 - My Chromebook will be situated securely on a flat, stable work surface.
 - My Chromebook will be treated carefully so it is not subjected to malicious or accidental damage (i.e. as a result of horseplay, pounding keys or mousepad).
 - I will carry my Chromebook in the closed position. I will never pick up or carry the Chromebook by the display screen or with one hand.
- 2. I will store my Chromebook in my **secured designated space** in my classroom when not in use (i.e. lunch, phys. ed., after school activities). My Chromebook stays at school.
- 3. I will be **on-task** during class at all times and use my Chromebook for **educational purposes**. **Non-educational games are not allowed at any time.**
- 4. I will not decorate, draw, or write on my Chromebook, or allow it to be subject to graffiti.
- 5. I will keep my Chromebook at a safe distance from food or liquids.
- 6. I will keep personal accounts/passwords private and will adhere to proper digital citizenship guidelines.
- 7. I will report to my teacher any inappropriate content I may encounter.
- 8. I will report any problems or damages to my Chromebook at the time of their occurrence immediately by notifying my homeroom teacher.
- 9. I understand that my Chromebook is property of St. Joseph Catholic School.

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Consequences for Violation of Chromebook Student Expectations:
