For Roumie, portraying Jesus has never been just an acting role—it's a spiritual journey. This season, as he stepped into pivotal moments like the entrance into Jerusalem and the Last Supper, he found himself deeply moved.

"I was just flooded with emotion," Roumie shared with Charisma Media, describing the moment he heard the crowd shout, *Hosanna, Son of David!* The weight of Jesus' final days became incredibly real, requiring more than just performance—it demanded spiritual preparation. Roumie leaned into his faith, praying extensively and even inviting his spiritual director to the set during key scenes.
