

Travel and Tourism: A Geographic Perspective, Grade 11 - CGG 301

Course Description

This course focuses on issues related to travel and tourism within and between various regions of the world. Students will investigate the unique environmental, sociocultural, economic, and political characteristics of selected world regions. They will explore travel patterns and trends, as well as tensions related to tourism, and will predict future tourism destinations. Students will apply the concepts of geographic thinking and the geographic inquiry process, including spatial technologies, to investigate the impact of the travel industry on natural environments and human communities. - > There will be one due date for an assessment (i.e. assignment, test)
 - If you need to negotiate a different due date, you must discuss this with your teacher **before** the first due date comes
- ➤ If there is nothing submitted or your work does not meet a Level 1, you will receive 45% (grades 9 and 10) or 35% (grades 11 and 12)
- > You will have multiple opportunities to demonstrate your learning throughout the course. In the event of a failing mark you will do the following:
 - Finish the late/incomplete assignment
 - o Discuss with teacher what steps you will take to ensure you are successful in earning the credit
- > Tests: Test days are important, if you miss a test, you must provide a validated absence. You will be able to write a different test at lunch on an agreed-upon date in conversation with your teacher. If you miss this second opportunity, you will receive a failing test mark.

Cheating and Plagiarism:

It is important for students to do their own best work. Most assignments for this class are done within the classroom, observed by the teacher, and this helps to minimize the chances of cheating and plagiarism. In the event that cheating or plagiarism occurs, the following consequences may be implemented, in consultation with administration, depending on the situation:

- 1. The student may be required to redo all or part of the assignment or assessment.
- 2. The student may be required to complete an alternate assignment or assessment.
- 3. The student's work may be treated as a missed assignment.

There may also be other consequences that are determined to be appropriate (e.g. detention, suspension, etc.) as per the school's progressive discipline process. Parents/guardians will be informed about the infraction and the consequences.
