Criteria for GOSH community governance working group membership

Over the past 18 months, an ad hoc team of previous GOSH organizers (including Francois, Jenny, Greg, Julieta, Shannon and Fernan) have been facilitating a conversation on community governance. Following exciting progress for the community in obtaining support for two years of activities, this work is to be taken forward by a working group tasked with addressing questions related to the community governance structure that emerged from a community call-in June 2020.

The most important feature of the working group is representation of the wider community so in developing its structure, we considered the following criteria:

- 1) History with GOSH. Significant work has been done since 2015 by the GOSH community to get us to where we are at in 2020. We have prioritized identifying working group members based on their previous engagement with GOSH activities. There will be many opportunities for others new to the community to get involved in GOSH activities, other organizing committees, and respond to consultations by this working group.
- 2) Regional representation and demographic equity. GOSH events have maintained a commitment to broad regional representation and equitable demographics. As the working group was created, we kept in mind our goals around demographics for the global event (noting that overlaps are possible): Women, trans, and/or non-conforming (52%); People of color, Indigenous people, and people from the Majority World (52%); Unaffiliated, community-based organizations and NGOs (33%).
- 3) Size of the group. To balance being effective and representative, we have designated a working group size of eleven people, representing the five main regions participating in GOSH activities and at the same time adequately addressing demographic diversity and ensuring a diverse range of perspectives and relevant experiences in governance and community. One member of the working group will be a representative of the board of the GOSH US nonprofit that is managing GOSH core funding.

The current working group will serve in a transitional role, working with the broader GOSH community to establish the framework within which a longer-termed community governance structure will be seated. The GOSH community will have every opportunity to participate in, and comment on, this process.

Governance questions raised during the GOSH Community Call in June 2020:

- What is a Community Governance Council?
 - This is the working title for the group who will have specific roles in community governance. The community governance working group will work with the broader community to determine its structure.
- Is the Community Governance Council legally part of the entity?
 - This is to be determined. The GOSH nonprofit board are consulting a lawyer on legal and liability implications.
- What types of decisions are located in this Council? Which are not?
 - The community governance working group will work with the broader community to answer this question. There are specific decisions related to the GOSH 501c3 organisation and the Sloan Foundation grant which for legal reasons need to remain with the board of the 501c3 and the named investigators on the grant (Jenny Molloy and Shannon Dosemagen).
- How are decisions made?
 - The community governance working group will work with the broader community to answer this question.
- In the future, would it be useful to have a second base for the NGO?
 - This may well turn out to be the case, there is nothing to preclude this from happening in the future.
- Which are the responsibilities of the community manager?
 - The community governance working group will work with the broader community to answer this question along with the named investigators on the grant who are responsible for ensuring the funded activities are delivered (Jenny Molloy and Shannon Dosemagen).
- Could the governance model be distributed in geographical groups?
 - The community governance working group will work with the broader community to answer this question.

- How the community gets involved in the decision-making process
