Lee Jennerjahn was born 19 July 1917 in Oshkosh, Wisconsin; the second of two sons born to William and Lulu Turner Jennerjahn.

This kind and gentle soul was a life-long resident of Oshkosh graduating from its high school in 1938. Following graduation, Lee enlisted in the United States Army where he served in the South Pacific during WWII.

When he returned to his native Oshkosh, he became employed at Segal Brothers' Produce and later joined Victralite/Lenox Candle Company from which he retired. During that time, Lee was a devoted son caring for his parents and a loving brother and uncle as well as a thoughtful friend to those surrounding his homestead's neighborhood.

Lee is survived by his nephew, Paul W. Jennerjahn and his wife Mary Kay; a niece, Susan Jennerjahn Barlow; six great-nephews and two great-nieces. Lee is fur-

ther survived by his sister-in-law, Dorothy Jennerjahn Schultz and devoted neighbors, Carl E. and Becky Schroeder all of Oshkosh. Lee was preceded in death by his parents and one brother, Clarence.
