# **Effective Summary Skills**

This handout is a summary of your learning on **making an effective summary** and writing an **expository paragraph**.

### Step One: Identify Main Ideas

- make a note next to each paragraph what is the paragraph about?
- once you have notes, review them together what is the overall topic the article is discussing?
- does the article have an opinion on the topic? if so, what is it?
  - is it judgemental? ("They did this, and they should never have been able to...")
  - does it support the idea? ("They did this, and it seems like it's been really positive...")
  - does it apologize for it? ("They did this, and although people claim it might hurt certain groups, it's actually much better for everyone...")

#### Step Two: Eliminate Minor Ideas

- make a list of the most common ideas in the article use your notes!
- highlight or circle ideas you need to know to understand the article
- put an X next to information that you don't absolutely need to know

#### Step Three: Watch for Transition Words

- stay focused on your highlights where does the author use transition words?
- if the author uses transition words **and** you are keeping information from both, make sure you are using transition words in your summary, too!

#### **Step Four**: Re-Order

- sometimes ideas don't fit together anymore
- go through your own highlighted main ideas and put them in an order that would make more sense to your reader

#### Step Five: Clean Out Your Opinion

- a summary should be a neutral retelling
- go through your ideas and double-check that everything is supported by the article

## **How to Write (Expository Paragraph)**

- a) a paragraph can have any number of sentences in it
- b) every paragraph needs a topic sentence what is it about?
- c) every sentence should be (1) making a claim, (2) explaining a claim, or (3) providing evidence of an explanation of a claim.
  - think of it like a tree or a path:
    - o claim -> explanation of claim -> evidence of explanation
- d) every paragraph needs a concluding sentence restatement of big ideas
  - do not just repeat yourself ("in this paragraph, I have looked at how...")
- e) avoid "in conclusion" it's lazy!
