About the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH) Conference

The ASALH Annual Conference is an occasion to explore the history and culture of people of African descent and is our largest program. The conference brings together more than one-thousand attendees, including educators, students, community builders, business professionals, and others who share an abiding interest in learning about the contributions of African Americans to this nation and the world. The conference provides important resources that support national operations and programming.

For well over a century, our conference has featured a rich program, which now includes scholarly sessions, professional workshops, plenaries, a film festival, and other presentations that analyze and illuminate a critical theme in the Black experience. This year's theme is African Americans and Labor. The program also includes luncheons, receptions, and an Awards Banquet featuring engaging speakers and highlights of the local and national Black history and culture.
