Once upon a time, there was a widowed king who had twelve daughters. The princesses were all beautiful and sweet, but Elise was the kindest and her father's most beloved.




One day, the king took a new wife who was actually a wicked witch.

Intermission


The minister had been following Elise to the graveyard at night full of zombies, but Elise focused on gathering the nettles.
