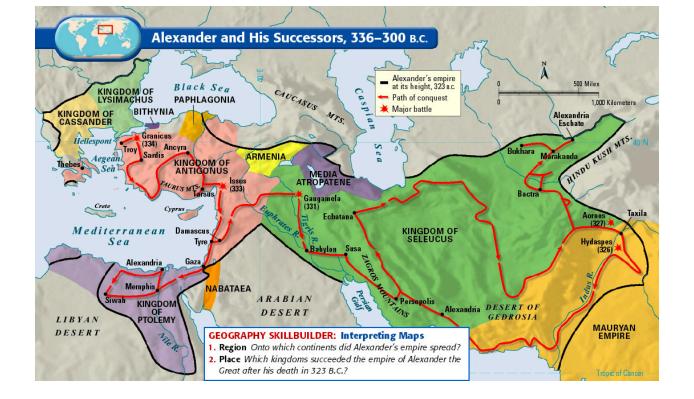
### **Alexander the Great**

## Egypt Dates of Campaign: 332 BCE

Describe the campaign:

- Established the city of Alexandria
- Egyptians welcomed Alexander and named him a Pharaoh (god-king)
- Didn't force egyptians to believe what he did

Why is this location important for Alexander's empire?

- The city of Alexandria was next to the Nile River
- The city became the center of trade

What cultural components were shared/taken because of this campaign?

- Statues of Greek gods all around the city
- Established a museum and library

How did Alexander's presence at this place alter world history?

- The city of Alexandria still stands, one of Egypt's largest cities

#### **Persia**

Dates of Campaign: 334 BCE until his

death in 323 BCE

Describe the campaign:

- Led 35.000 soldiers into Persia
- Defeated the Persian Army
- Darius III tried to offer peace settlements, Alexander rejected
- Darius III was killed by his own troops
- Declared himself as King of Persia

Why is this location important for Alexander's empire?

- Finishing what his father started in Persia... wants control of Persia

What cultural components were shared/taken because of this campaign?

- Mass wedding Persian soldiers married Macedonian women
- Alexander adopted Persian customs

How did Alexander's presence at this place alter world history?

- Decline of the Persian Empire as they knew it

India

Dates of Campaign: 326 BCE

Describe the campaign:

- Alexander DEFEATS large indian army and 4,000 elephants
- Troops back down
- Alexander and his troops return home

Why is this location important for Alexander's empire?

- Heard of India's riches
- Desire to conquer new lands

What cultural components were shared/taken because of this campaign?

- Gandhara School of Art
  - Used Greece techniques, but their images were Indian culture
- Indian Stage Drama (plays)
- Greeks borrowed concepts of Folklore from India

How did Alexander's presence at this place alter world history?

- Spread of Greek culture to an area that hadn't been exposed to that yet
- The end of Alexander's conquest
