## Ensemble Dramaturgy Note for Bodice

Cinched. Constricting. Seductive. Designed to shape a woman's body into idyllic proportions, bodices have long embodied the paradox of fashion—simultaneously inviting sexualization while enforcing control. When your lady's maid ties you into such a garment, your waist disappears, and your breasts instantly perk. However, the bodice doesn't simply reshape the body—it offers it up, shining a light on your curves with theatrical precision, turning the torso into a stage for desire.

The girls don the same “Uniform” (jeans, a little top, sneakers) and dance to the same music at sticky-floored frat houses, constrained by the expectations of women at big state schools who are pressured to dress for the male gaze, not themselves. Bodice highlights the fact that despite the three women dressing almost identically, conforming to the uniform, they are each unique, complex, distinct, layered young women under their tiny tops and jeans. Women like Ivy, Bridget, and Aelin are often overlooked, stereotyped, and made fun of in the media because of their appearance and style, but this play makes a concerted effort to share their stories.

**Stranger Stars** by Molly Stern ‘25, February 23.

The stars aligned when Cassiopeia met Orion, but stars are fickle, as are men. Rachel, Cassie’s best friend, should be happy for her, right? Joanne, Rachel’s (first) girlfriend, sure thinks so. But when tensions rise between best friends and lovers, jealousy threatens loyalty and complicates love. “Stranger Stars” lies between intertwined and unaligned. Revel in the mess.

**Sudanese Play** by Amal Elsidig ‘25, April 11.

Sudanese Play is a comedy about prom dresses, role-playing games, and marriage. But more than that, it’s all about love, guilt, and grief. We follow as two generations of sisters, mothers, and daughters navigate their relationships with each other across two different worlds, and all the rifts and cycles that come with it.

**Serpent’s Tongue** by Abby Bettencourt ‘25, April 16.

Stheno is controlling, Euryale is exhausted, and Medusa just wants to get the hell out of here. Serpent’s Tongue spins the original myth of Medusa on its head, asking us to look at who are the real villains of our stories.

**Dark Red and Strange Overtones** by Mareme Fall ‘25, April 30 5:00 p.m.

As the sun begins to set on the vanishing world around them, a family with much distance between them are brought back together once more.

**Lucky Strike** by Foster Schrader ‘25, May 1, 2, 4 7:00 p.m. (The Mug).

Lucky Strike is about in between- childhood and adolescence, the left and the right. It’s about gaps, and trying to bridge them, and failing.

## **About the STEERMAN New Play Series by Peter Gil-Sheridan, Steerman Festival Coordinator**

The series is named for Emeritas James Steerman to honor his work as the longtime chair of the Drama and Film Department. Welcome to the 5th Annual Steerman New Play Festival! We are so grateful you’re here to experience an evening of original work by one of our incredible writers. When I started teaching at Vassar in 2020, I had this idea for a new play festival that featured the brilliant work our students are creating. When I say that the Steerman Festival is only a very small portion of the creative work that our students generate, I do not exaggerate. For

all the perils we are facing in this world and in this country, I am inspired daily by the ferocious hearts and original minds of our playwrights.

Every week, I watch our students as they present new work for the first time. I see this profound joy in their faces as they watch their imaginings and longings come to life. It is that joy that gets me out of bed every day. To see young people discover their power as artists week in and week out makes clear to me the power of art. This weekend, we are presenting Emma Lawrence's *Bodice* and Thomas Rombach's *Hello My Name Is*. These two plays are 12th and 13th plays we have produced since I joined the faculty in 2020. Emma's play starts off feeling like an ordinary night, three best friends celebrating like college girls do. But as the play progresses, we get a glimpse inside the dangers that so many young women face on college campuses.

What I love about Emma's play is that it is a warning to write these women off at our peril. To assume that any woman, regardless of the clothes they wear, the makeup they love, is deserving of what befalls her characters reminds us misogyny, even amongst women, runs deep.

Thomas's play, in many ways an inverse of *Bodice*, explores the struggles that men have reaching one another. The story centers a father, lost in years of loneliness unable to express emotions to his son or his colleagues. Thomas's meditative and spare play explores these issues with humor, sensitivity, and care. The play is asking us to consider men, to remember that men are expected to be stoic and independent, to never ask for help. I see it as a cultural crisis, one that drives our current political landscape, one that likely impacts the off-stage men that visit such harm upon Emma's women.

For the first time this year, we have also presented six new play workshops, an exciting addition that provides writers with the opportunity to refine their work over the course of 3 weeks in a collaborative, developmental setting. These workshops further our commitment to fostering new voices and ensuring that emerging playwrights have the support they need to bring their visions to life, here and beyond their time at Vassar. These plays, written by Abby Bettencourt, Amal Elsiddig, Mareme Fall, Ivy Schenk, Foster Schrader, and Molly Stern are capstone pieces that examine the world we live in as dynamically as the plays you'll see this weekend. Ella Talerico, is the winner of this year's Swartz Seven Prize, for her play *Alien(e)* and will feature faculty members Hannah Gaff and Conrad Schott alongside Associate Director of Leadership Gifts Molly Katz.

There are very few colleges or universities in this country that offer full productions of full-length plays to young playwrights. For the last five years, the Drama Department has coalesced around our writers, to give them a chance to showcase their original work to the community. But this Festival is not just a benefit our writers, but a crucial part of the training we offer to our student stage managers, technicians, directors, actors, designers, and dramaturgs alike. Working on a living, breathing, evolving text is a unique part of learning how to make



theatre. Through the new play process, through rewriting, cutting, expanding, contracting, artists have to learn to think quickly on their feet. The scene you rehearsed yesterday might not be in the play tomorrow. New ideas emerge in collaboration. Moments get strength tested. The play is not a staid piece of work collecting dust on a library shelf but brand new, striving for articulation, alive.
