


Natick Recovery Learning Program

Weekend and Vacation Learning February 16, 2021 - April 20, 2021


A lot of hard work on behalf of Natick educators went into designing and planning authentic learning experiences, steeped in priority standards, for hybrid and remote learning environments. This endeavor was thrust upon us by a global pandemic and our educators have responded by running to the problem rather than running away. That being said, we recognize that school, as it is currently constructed, is challenging our resilience as we look for creative ways to meet the health, safety and intellectual needs of our students. We also recognize that students have reacted to the new learning conditions in a variety of ways. Some students have developed strong initiative and self direction skills that have carried them through difficult times. Other students have struggled to develop those skills and need extra instruction to help them meet learning expectations.


We know through common assessment data and daily interaction with students in the remote and in-person settings, that math skills across grade levels and high school writing skills are two areas that need to be addressed. Knowing that we have a population of students who need additional targeted instruction to meet grade level and course requirements, we have developed an intervention program outside of the school day to mitigate further learning loss. This Renaissance Learning data from Fall benchmark over the last three years illustrates that our students are meeting grade level benchmarks at a relatively consistent rate. While there are reports of significant skill degradation across the country being reported, we have not seen that trend in Natick. These graphs show the percentage of students who have already met end-of-year thresholds in reading and math skills for grades five through eight. These percentages will rise throughout the year as more and more students meet the benchmark standards. One consistent indicator we see in these graphs is the need to intervene for select students in mathematics. While the dip we see in fall 2020 is not dramatic, it is consistent across those four grades indicating a trend across all grades that needs to be addressed.

The "Natick Recovery Learning" program is a grant funded program by the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education that will focus on teaching students mathematics skills in grades two through eleven as well writing skills in grades nine and ten. These two curriculum areas have surfaced as needing additional targeted instruction based upon priority standard analysis and student performance on common assessments.

The Natick Recovery Learning Program will consist of vacation week learning camps and weekend workshops. These camps and workshops will be tied directly to the curriculum being taught in grade level courses for the students who struggle the most to learn the priority standards. The strategy is based on helping students progress through their coursework throughout the week and semester to develop durable skills beyond this year.

Who is eligible to participate?

To participate in the program, students will be referred by a teacher to school administration and program coordinators. Parents will be notified of the referral by the referring teacher and the Office of Teaching, Learning, and Innovation.

How do parents/guardians register their child?

Parents and students will receive an email notification once they are recommended to the recovery learning program and will need to fill out the required form to attend. Registration forms are due by 12:00 p.m. on Friday, February 5, 2021.

When will course times be announced?

Once all registrations have been received, teachers and coordinators will assign students to courses. High School courses will be coordinated to allow students to participate in both the math and writing courses if necessary. Parents and students will be notified of their course assignment by their assigned teacher by 12:00 p.m. on Thursday, February 10, 2021.
