Her family-centered approach and commitment to promoting inclusivity in education empowers students and caregivers to advocate for their needs in and out of the classroom. Another one of Alli's roles at PMHS is the school's McKinney-Vento Liaison. The purpose of the McKinney-Vento Education of Homeless Children and Youth Act is to ensure that all children experiencing homelessness have equal access to the same free appropriate public education provided to children and youth who are permanently housed. If your student is currently (1) Sharing the home of another due to economic hardship, fire, etc., (2) Living in a hotel, motel, camp ground, or other temporary accommodation, (3) Living in emergency shelter or transitional housing, (4) Living in a car, park, abandoned building, bus/train station, or other substandard housing, or (5) An unaccompanied youth or runaway, they may be eligible for federal benefits through McKinney-Vento! What are some of the roles of the school counselor?

School counselors help all students:

- > with schedule changes
- > apply academic achievement strategies
- > manage emotions and apply interpersonal skills
- > plan for postsecondary options (higher education, military, work force)

School Counselors provide:

- individual student academic planning and goal setting
- > short-term counseling to students
- > referrals for long-term support
- > collaboration with families /teachers/ administrators/ community for student success
- advocacy for students at individual education plan meetings and other student-focused meetings



- > data analysis to identify student issues, needs and challenges
- > acting as a systems change agent to improve equity and access, achievement and opportunities for all students

Upcoming Activities / Dates / Important Information:

09/12/24 - Pack Sign Up - College Applications for Seniors - Starting this year, seniors can sign up for assistance, from the counselors, during their Pack time to focus on getting their college applications completed in a timely manner.

09/18/24 - St. Paul's School - A representative from the St. Paul's School in Concord, NH will be here at 9:00 a.m. to meet with juniors and sophomores and discuss the Advanced Studies Program which is offered in the summer. Students should sign up in the Counseling Department for this presentation or let their counselor know that they would like to attend. What is St. Paul's Advanced Studies Program (ASP)? Since 1958, talented rising seniors and highly motivated rising juniors from high schools around New Hampshire have come together for the Advanced Studies Program at St. Paul's School. The five-week-long ASP is more than summer school — it's a unique, immersive and transformative program that is equal parts academic exploration, college preparation ... and fun. The ASP is about diving deep into thought-provoking classes in which you encounter real-world problems and relevant ideas. It is about developing friendships with like-minded peers from across the state, being exposed to new activities and new career paths. 9/19/24 - A representative from the University of Maine will be at PMHS at 12:30 - 1:30 to speak with prospective students.

9/27/24 - Field trip to The NH Construction Career Days. The (NHCCD) exposes NH high school students to possible career paths in both the construction and transportation industries through hands-on exhibits and educational resources. Students should sign up, and pick up a permission form, in the Counseling Dept. as soon as possible as seats are limited to 30 students. This is for students in grades 10 - 12. The field trip will be from 8:00 a.m. - 2:15 p.m.

9/30/24 - Senior College Night for High School Seniors & Parents/Guardians at 6:00 p.m. in the PMHS Auditorium. This presentation is for Seniors and their families. They will learn everything they need to know about the college application process. This presentation is similar to Applying to College 101 for juniors, but with a stronger focus on timelines, deadlines, and how to stay organized. This presentation will prepare seniors for their immediate next steps.

10/02/24 - A representative from **Colby Sawyer** will be at PMHS at 9:00 - 10:00 to speak with prospective students.



10/02/24 - A representative from **Endicott College** will be at PMHS at 1:20 - 2:20 to speak with prospective students.

10/04/24 - A representative from **St. Anselm's College** will be at PMHS at 8:30 - 9:30 to speak with prospective students.

10/07/24 - A representative from **Southern New Hampshire University** will be at PMHS at 10:30 - 11:30 to speak with prospective students.

10/07/24 - A representative from **Plymouth State University** will be at PMHS at 1:45 - 2:45 to speak with prospective students.

*Please note - These are the college representative visits that we have scheduled as of this publication. There will be more scheduled as requested.

10/08/24 - PSAT / NMSQTs for Juniors - This is a voluntary exam. The Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) is a standardized test administered by the College Board and cosponsored by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) in the United States. Scores from the PSAT/NMSQT are used to determine eligibility and qualification for the National Merit Scholarship Program. This exam is also a good practice test for the SATs which will be administered to all juniors in the spring. Interested students should sign up in the Counseling Department.

10/22/24 - ASVABS - The Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) is a multiple-aptitude battery that measures developed abilities and helps predict future academic and occupational success in the military. It is administered annually to more than one million military applicants, high school, and post-secondary students. Students in grades 10 - 12 should sign up in the Counseling Department to take the ASVABs. The ASVABS are scheduled from 8:00 - 11:00.

10/29/24 - Apply NH - On this date, PMHS seniors can apply for college in NH and the application fee is waived! This is a national effort through the American College Application Campaign (ACAC) to help high school seniors navigate the college admissions process and increase the number of students who submit college applications, with a particular focus on first-generation and low-income students. College and career access professionals volunteer to work with seniors during school time to complete and submit at least one application to a postsecondary program of their choice! Students should sign up in the Counseling Department for this great opportunity! One student, who participates in Apply NH, will receive a \$500 scholarship for participating!

11/04/24 - Financial Aid 101 – High School Seniors & Parents/Guardians – at 6:00 p.m. in the PMHS Auditorium. Families will learn how to navigate the federal financial aid process (FAFSA). We'll explore what types of additional aid are available and review scholarship searches. We'll also highlight the importance of meeting deadlines. Attendees will receive a digital copy of Granite Edvance's Financial Aid Insider.



11/14/24 - Career Pathways Fair - 9:00 - 11:00 am in the PMHS gymnasium. This fair is for students who are looking at attending trade schools, community colleges, doing apprenticeships, joining the military, participating in a gap year, or taking advantage of some great local employment opportunities.

01/06/24 - Paying for College 101 – High School Seniors & Parents/Guardians – at 6:00 p.m. in the PMHS Auditorium. Students and families will learn what comes next after they receive their financial aid offers from colleges. We'll break down the different components of the offer letter and explain how to compare multiple offers. We'll also explore options for covering college costs. We encourage attendees to bring their offer letter(s) if possible.
