	<p>Many people said watching or reading the news makes them feel bad or bored.</p>

Things that Make It Hard to Get the News



Parents or guardians sometimes don't want to or let people with I/DD watch or read the news. Usually that is because they want to protect them from learning about bad things.



Some people with I/DD have other people tell them about the news.




The words in the news are sometimes hard to understand. For some people, reading news is harder to understand than watching it.

	<p>Most people we talked to did not look for stories about disability in the news.</p>
	<p>They want the news to help nondisabled people learn about disability.</p>
	<p>A lot of news stories make mistakes or have bad messages about disability.</p>
	<p>People want to see more good stories about people with I/DD.</p>

Making the News Better for People with I/DD



Some ideas people had to make the news easier to understand:


- Include pictures and videos with writing.
- Have braille or text-to-speech versions of stories.
- Make the writing easier to understand.
- Include summaries.
- Slow down and have clear breaks in videos and audio.



Some ideas for making better news stories about I/DD:

- Interview people with I/DD.
- Write about good things that people with I/DD do.
- Treat people with I/DD with respect.

Our Conclusion



Access to news is important. People with I/DD deserve to know what is happening in the world. It can help people be more included in the community.

	<p>We need to treat people with I/DD as adults. That means not stopping people with I/DD from getting access to news. It also talking to people with I/DD for the news.</p>
	<p>People with I/DD want more positive stories about I/DD. Journalists need to listen to what they want.</p>
	<p>People with I/DD should be included as sources in all kinds of news stories.</p>
	<p>We want to do more. We need to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Include people who do not speak and who have high support needs. ● We can create new ways to include people with I/DD in research and news. ● We can develop new tools to make better news by and for people with I/DD.

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
