¹ Our worship service uses ancient words. Many are found in the Bible, some are prayers of saints. This reminds us that we participate in something much bigger and older than us. Mysteriously we are participating and being drawn into worship that started long before we were born and which will continue long after we have died.

³ "The 'original' sin is not primarily that man has 'disobeyed' God; the sin is that he ceased to be hungry for Him and for him alone, ceased to see his whole life depending on the whole world as a sacrament of communion with God. … The fall is not that he preferred world to God, distorted the balance between the spiritual and material, but that he made the world material, whereas he was to have transformed it into 'life in God', filled with meaning and spirit." ~Alexander Schmemann

We Celebrate Communion:5

L: The Lord be with you. A: And also with you.

L: Lift up your hearts. A: We lift them to the Lord.

L: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

A: It is right to give our thanks and praise.

L: It is indeed right that we should praise you, gracious God, for you created all things. You formed us in your own image: male and female you created us.

When we turned away from you in sin, you did not cease to care for us, but opened a path of salvation for all people.

You made a covenant with Israel, and through your servants Abraham and Sarah gave the promise of a blessing to all nations. Through Moses you led your people from bondage into freedom; through the prophets you renewed your promise of salvation. Therefore, with them, and with all your saints who have served you in every age, we give thanks and raise our voices to proclaim the glory of your name.

⁴Praise be to you, LORD, the God of our father Israel, from everlasting to everlasting. ... Everything in heaven and earth is yours. ... Everything comes from you, and we have given you only what comes from your hand" 1 Chronicles 29. 10, 11, 14.

⁵ We believe that Jesus is present as we share in communion. In some mysterious way we receive him in this act. Jesus said "this is my body" and "this is the cup of my blood". This is more than a symbol, but we should also be wary of trying to define too clearly how this works.

He healed the sick and ate and drank with outcasts and sinners; he opened the eyes of the blind and proclaimed the good news of your kingdom to the poor and to those in need.

In all things he fulfilled your gracious will. On the night he freely gave himself to death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: this is my body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Gracious God, his perfect sacrifice destroys the power of sin and death; by raising him to life you give us life for evermore.

L: Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith

A: 6 7 Christ has died, Christ is Risen, Christ will come again

L: Recalling his death, proclaiming his resurrection, and looking for his coming again in glory, we offer you, Father, this bread and this cup. Send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon these gifts, that all who eat and drink at this table may be one body and one holy people, a living sacrifice in Jesus Christ, our Lord. Through Christ, with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory is yours, almighty Father, now and for ever.

A: Amen.

L: As our Saviour taught us, let us pray,

A: Our Father, in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial, and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and for ever. Amen.



⁶ "Lamb of God"- Jesus is the Passover lamb sacrificed for our sins (1 Cor 5:7-8; 1 Pt 1:19; Rv 5:6). In ancient Jewish sacrificial rites the sacrificial animal also had to be eaten as part of the Passover celebration (Ex 12:8-12). The meal that followed the sacrifice conveyed the sealing of the covenant and created communion among the participants and God.

Choke Cherry Tree: Following the work of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, it was decided by our bishop and a group of Cree elders that, as a symbol of our renewed relationship, the churches of the Diocese would plant chokecherry trees. The chokecherry is sacred in cree tradition, and has been used as food and medicine. Our planting this tree is a chance to honor the traditions and prayers of a people who have lived on this land much longer than any European settlers. On Pentecost the young trees were blessed and sent home with clergy to be planted. Take time to notice ours in front of the church.
