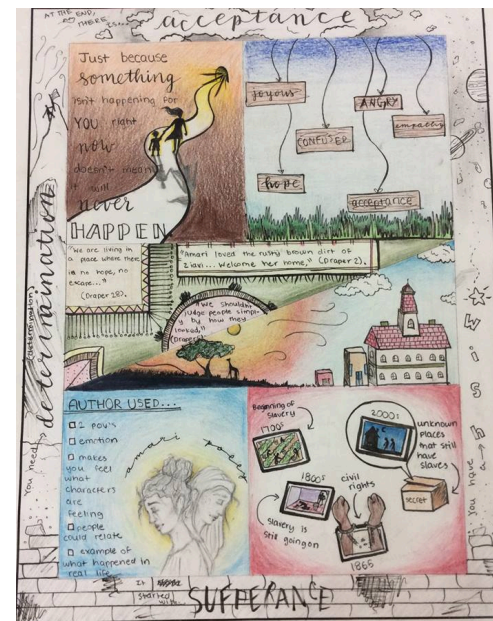
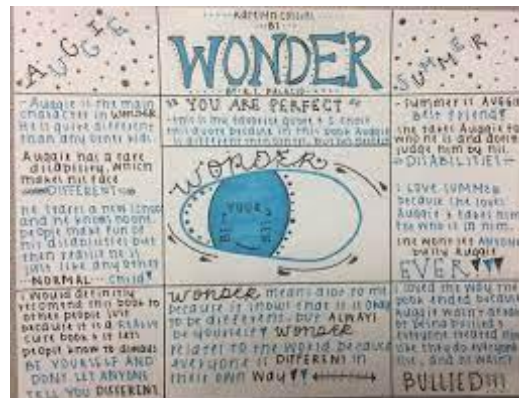
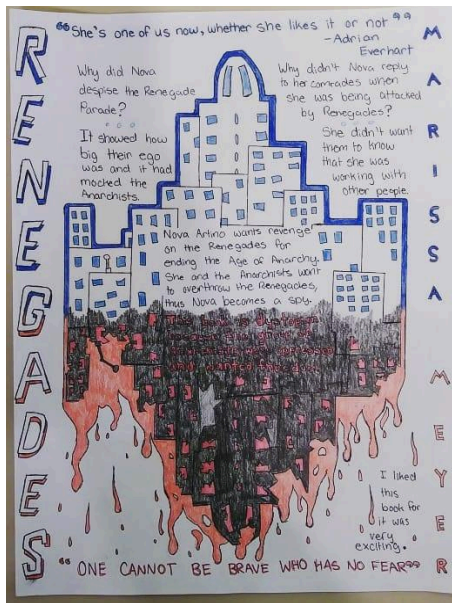

What is a One-Pager?

A one-pager combines words and pictures on a single piece of paper to create a visual representation that displays your understanding and analysis of a text.



What Should My One-Pager Include?

You may use a single page of white printer paper measuring 8.5" by 11", the [provided template](#), or a Google Slides measuring 8.5" by 11" (Go to file → page setup → custom). On **one side** of your paper only, include the following:

- ❑ Your first and last **name and class** number
- ❑ The **title and author** of your book
- ❑ Words and images that illustrate the **central idea** or **theme** of your book, and **one piece of text evidence** to support your analysis (include quotation marks and the page #)
- ❑ Words and images that show the importance of the **setting** in some way and include **one piece of text evidence** to support your analysis (include quotation marks and the page #)
- ❑ Words and images that illustrate the **internal and/or external conflict** and explain **how the main character(s) changed** throughout the text
- ❑ Words and images that make a **connection** to the book (this can be a text-to-self, text-to-text or a text-to-world connection)
- ❑ Write one thought provoking **question** about your book and provide the answer (This is **not** a yes or no question)

Where can I find the books?

You can find these titles at your local library, bookstore, and on SORA. [SORA](#) is a FREE database of ebooks and audiobooks provided by the DOE and can be accessed on any device using your DOE account.

How do I log on to SORA?

First you need to create a DOE account, click [HERE](#) to begin.

Once you have created your DOE account, you can go to the [website](#) or download the app on your device.

Your setup code is **NYCSCHOOLS** or you can search for your school as **NEW YORK CITY DEPT OF EDUCATION**.
