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## **Abstract**

In this presentation,I will try to briefly present the ways that "Little Tree that will become a forest"-an libertarian pre-school community of the active Greece-decolonizespower, knowledge and being, by deploying a theoretical background inspired by decolonial feminisms. This paper proceeds in two main sections: first there is a short introduction to decolonial conceptsof modernity/coloniality, coloniality of power, knowledge and being along with a short analysis of the main tenets of decolonial feminist theories. That way I will try to highlight the ways a decolonial feminist perspective can enrich the field of the commons. In the second section by using datacollected while conducting part of my PhD researchsuch as interviews, observations and material created by the community itselfI will reflect upon the ways Little Treenot only governs a specific resource- educationbut mainly creates a decolonial commons that destabilizes the established ways of knowledge production in crisis-ridden Greece and resignifies community, care, education, childhood, and social reproduction.
