## **Abstract**

In this presentation, I will try to briefly present the ways that "*Little Tree that will become a forest*"—an active libertarian pre-school community of the commons in Greece—decolonizes power, knowledge and being, by deploying a theoretical background inspired by decolonial feminisms. This paper proceeds in two main sections: first there is a short introduction to decolonial concepts of modernity/coloniality, coloniality of power, knowledge and being along with a short analysis of the main tenets of decolonial feminist theories. That way I will try to highlight the ways a decolonial feminist perspective can enrich the field of the commons. In the second section by using data collected while conducting part of my PhD research such as interviews, observations and material created by the community itself I will reflect upon the ways *Little Tree* not only governs a specific resource—education—but mainly creates a decolonial commons that destabilizes the established ways of knowledge production in crisis-ridden Greece and resignifies community, care, education, childhood, and social reproduction.
