Technology choices

For coding projects, Code for Boston is *mostly* technology- and programming language-agnostic as a community. We generally believe that development teams can pick the best tools for the job they're trying to do, and we've had projects done in Python, Ruby, Javascript and many more languages. Our only real rule is that the language choices be open source, and that projects utilize some open-source license (we recommend the MIT license).

For version control, we use Github, <u>which you can find here</u>. If you need a repo for your project at some point, let us know and we'll set you up.
