Flexible Assessment Question Types

In a flexible assessment, you choose the **question type** for each item on your assessment. With a variety of options to match your assessment goals, each question type has unique settings that may apply.

1. Multiple Choice **Auto-Scored**

- One answer is correct

2. Constructed Response **Teacher-Scored**

- Item Type** Choose a rubric scale with a maximum rubric weight or 4=4 points, 3=3 points, etc.
- Paper Options** include lines or pages to show student work and **Background** options of blank, grid or lined.
- Great for** Short Answer, Essay

3. Explicit Constructed Response **Auto-Scored; Online Testing Only**

- Item Type:** Enter the **case-sensitive, correct answer(s)** and **point values**
- Great for:** Fill in the blank, Diagrams, Matching, where the answer can be determined *automatically*, not subjectively

4. Multiple Choice Partial Credit **Auto-Scored**

- Item Type:** Enter the correct answer; If incorrect, the weight or **points** will be *deducted* from the total points of the item when enabled.
- Don't want deductions?** Use multiple choice instead.
- Great for:** Questions with option to deduct points if *partially* correct.



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5. Multiple Choice Advanced **Auto-Scored**

- **Item Details:** Enter all of *alternative correct answer(s)* and weight or points to each answer
- **Great for:** Questions that require a weighting of answer choices such as BCD=3 but BC=4 because it is the BEST answer

6. Constructed Response Advanced **Teacher-Scored**

- **Item Details:** Choose a rubric scale with a *weighted* rubric such as 4=16 points, 3=13 points, and so on or, now can choose **No Rubric** with a final point value as the maximum score
- **Paper Options** include lines or pages to show student work and **Background** options of blank, grid or lined.
- **Great for:** Short Answer, Essay

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7. Number Grid **Auto-Scored; Paper/Pencil Testing Only**

- **Item Details:** 4 columns, numbers 0-9 and 4 characters. Ability to have 1-8 columns. Only available for paper/pencil administration.
- **Great for:** Math response questions
