{{Y&R Slugga: The Most Dangerous White Boy In Jacksonville}}?

[insert clip from 0:02 - 0:05] Y&R Slugga Tee is probably the most ruthless individual in the ATK versus KTA war that you might not have heard about.

And if you haven't, it's because he was put away in jail for something so unexpected before the beef exploded [clips of "Who I Smoke" and "When I See You" with viewer count showing] into millions of views on YouTube.

But believe it or not, some people would consider the streets of Jacksonville safer because this one white boy was off the streets.

Lemme show you why.

{{Early Days and Y&R Affiliation}}

If you're really tapped into the Jacksonville rap scene, then you already know that {{Insert Image}} Y&R Slugga Tee is one of the most talked about figures in Florida's underground.

His appeal came from the fact that he was a white boy in the trenches, {{Insert Image}} knee deep in Jacksonville's ongoing war between KTA and ATK. Both black dominated groups.

But to be honest, you could say that Slugga was born for this.

His maternal grandmother is {{Insert Image}} Robin Colombo - the wife of Jerry Colombo from the {{Insert Image}} infamous Colombo crime family of the Cosa Nostra.

If that name rings any bells, it's because Jerry and his wife Robin were tied to the {{Insert Background Clip from 0:12 - 0:18}} [\\$24 million McDonald's Monopoly scam](#) that ran from 1989 to 2001, with HBO covering the story in their {{Insert Image}} documentary *McMillions*.

Robin Colombo would be one of the 21 indicted by the FBI for the scam, serving 18 months in federal prison for the crime.

But beyond his roots, Slugga really got into the life from his environment.

He grew [{{Insert Map Image}}](#) up in the Greater Arlington area, a neighborhood on the East side of the city.

As a kid, he attended the now closed [{{Insert Image and Insert Image}}](#) Justina Road Elementary School, playing football after joining the Arlington Pop Warner team.

And allegedly, [{{Insert Image}}](#) some of the same kids he played with would later become key players in Jacksonville's deadly rap beef- names that now ring out in the war between ATK and Y&R.

Their coaches had to be motivating them with Von and Chief Keef songs in the locker room 'cause it's a bit crazy they were training the next generation of drill all at once.

[{{Insert Background Clip from 0:00-0:08}}](#) Slugga was about to get some real life motivation though. One that disrupted his seemingly normal early life.

[{{Insert Image}}](#) This event happened on August 10, 2013, when [{{Insert Image}}](#) Slugga's cousin- 14 year old Megan Simmons was murdered in a drive-by shooting.

She was just an innocent bystander, caught in the crossfire while attending a sleepover at a friend's house.

Her friend, [{{Insert Image}}](#) Jazmine Shelton, who was 13 at the time, was also hit.

Megan would live in critical condition for an additional 4 days before succumbing to her injuries, with Jazmine dying on the spot.

The circumstances surrounding the shooting definitely changed how Slugga saw his environment.

[{{"The kids were of course not the target.. And that the target was someone else in the house. The investigation revealed that there had been in a violent altercation between occupants of the residence and a known male in the area."}}](#)

Slugga definitely didn't want to be a casualty of some other person's beef.

[{{Insert Image}}](#) So with the murder remaining unsolved to this day, [{{Insert Image}}](#) some would speculate that it was at this point that a 12-year-old Slugga Tee- [{{Insert Image}}](#) who would be pictured at his cousin's vigil later on- would get a harsh reality on what the Jacksonville streets were about.

[{{Insert Image}}](#) He would start thuggin and by age 15, [{{Insert Image}}](#) [{{Insert Background Clip from 0:00-0:05 cut to 0:02-0:07}}](#) he wasn't just fighting; he was dominating.

Videos from those years show him fighting opponents, [{{Insert Image}}](#) his fast hands earning him the nickname "Slugga."

At this point, [{{Insert Image}}](#) he was already heavily affiliating himself with Y&R, a music label, according to Slugga.

[{{"So.. Y&R that stand for Young and Reckless, right? No.. that uh.. We Young and Ruthless... Young and Ruthless- alright; what are the origins of Y&R, like how did you get started with them? ... really started that shit uh some.. like a music label- you feel me?"}}](#)

In reality, [Y&R](#) (Young and Ruthless) which was formerly known as DankWay, [{{Insert Image}}](#) is a set from the southside of Jacksonville known as Arlington, with few members located in Lackawanna, Florida.

Y&R is under KTA, which stands for [Kill Them All](#), a collection of sets that include [{{Insert Image}}](#) 6 Block or Avante land- a territory running from 45th and Moncrief to Avenue B- originally called PCE.

KTA has its roots dating back to the morning of Saturday May 27 2017, [{{Insert Image}}](#) where Foolio's cousin Zion Brown , aka TJ/Ziko, was [shot and killed](#) by [{{Insert Background Clip}}](#) ATK affiliates Ksoo and Yungeen Ace's homie, Deontrae Thomas aka Trae Shordy.

The shooting that claimed Zion's life also left his [2 sisters injured](#).

This was the catalyst for KTA.

Rappers who represent KTA include [{{Insert Image}}](#) the late Foolio, [{{Insert Image}}](#) K Shordy and many others.

[{{Insert Background Clip from 0:37-1:05}}](#) And over on the Westside of Jacksonville, we have KTA's rival gang, ATK or "Ace's Top Killers".

After Zion's death, [{{Insert Image}}](#) Y&R and ATK's beef would run deep, with a block party brawl in 2017 almost turning deadly.

According to street rumors, that night took a turn [{{Insert Image}}](#) when a shot was fired, [{{Insert Image}}](#) grazing Y&R Mookey.

Word on the street is that [{{Insert Image}}](#) ATK affiliate 23 was the one who pulled the trigger, and in the chaos that followed, it was allegedly Slugga Tee who pulled out his weapon and fired back.

That moment became part of Jacksonville street history, and Y&R Mookey himself rapped about it in his song [Dead Opps](#):

"They popped up out the cut and tried to leave a nigga dead / I got grazed, Slugga shot back, Bree should've left 'em dead."

So believe me, Slugga Tee wasn't just another white boy in the hood- he went to war alongside his brothers.

Even the opps acknowledged that much.

Like when ATK's Ksoo [{{Insert Image}}](#) responded to Mookey's *Dead Opps* by dissing KTA, Mookey and Slugga in [Bang It Out](#). He claimed that Slugga Tee got chased down the same night Mookey got grazed:

"Mookey what you on boy? We don't really know your ass / I ain't gon speak too much, but your ass was almost fucking grass / You bang that KTA? Boy yo ass better be safe / We had Slugga on a chase, almost ate that nigga face."

The title of "the most dangerous white boy in Jacksonville" was earned by the fact that he was an active participant in the war- someone who had been in shootouts, taken losses, been to Juvenile and later prison.

He would further give himself the name "Baby Murda" telling his fans to no longer call him 'Slugga'

"Hey look though.. I don't want nobody calling me Slugga no more man.. I.. I'm Baby Murda.. know me now .. I'm Baby Murda."

That's right, and Baby Murda was one half of the Murda Twinz. His homie, Y&R Mookey was the other half.

Y&R Slugga Tee and Y&R Mookey had been locked in since way back.

"uh.. I don't even remember.. Shit.. _when we was jits, on my bro.. What's your friendship with him like; you guys like best frie.. You're like brothers-right? So.. what's it like to hang with him? Yeah, that my main man,

shit, you cannot come between us, you feel me, we just.. Shit we just trying to make it out- that's all- you feel me?"}}

But the Murda Twinz had their destinies so tied together, that if one fell, you knew the other was going to fall too. And that's exactly what happened.

Y&R Slugga Tee's run-ins with the law mirror those of his Murda Twin, Y&R Mookey, in a way that almost feels fated.

To fully grasp the connection, we have to rewind to 2018, when Y&R Mookey first found himself behind bars for a series of car burglaries.

One particularly infamous incident involved Mookey and **{{Insert Image}}** rapper SpotemGottem.

A gun would be found.

Mookey would be taken into custody, while SpotemGottem was set free, **{{Insert Image}}** with this whole thing having fans speculating that SpotemGottem might've snitched on Mookey.

{{Insert Background Clip from 0:11-0:17 cut to 0:41-0:47 cut 1:14-1:20}} 1090 Jake would explain that Spottem had told police that Mookey was trying to conceal "a pole" when his crib got raided, detailing the situation very vividly according to the documents.

Mookey would later shut the whole snitch allegations down, saying Spottem was his brother and had nothing to do with his case.

As for SpotemGottem, he would address the situation on Say Cheese, stating that he and Mookey were straight.

“I mean.. We’re straight. He good.. On bro.. I still flow and I love that nigga; feel me? Is it like I don’t know.. You know how niggas be; if some shit happens, I guess niggas thought I told or whatever; niggas saying this that and third but niggas like never came to me.. Like paperwork never was like paperwork don’t lie.. Paperwork never was how’d it take 2 years?”

[[Insert Image and Insert Image and Insert Image and Insert Image]] The comment section though, was having none of it, with most accusing Spottem of being a snitch.

[[Insert Image]] Spottem Gottem is currently incarcerated for an unrelated charge.

[[Insert Background Clip from 0:23-0:45]] The case against Y&R Mookey ended up getting dropped after the state failed to file charges within the stipulated 30-day window.

Aside from the fact that Mookey’s crib was a rental from Slugga’s mom, this case is crucial in Slugga’s story because it acted as a trigger for the gun charges that would later follow both of them.

Mookey would be back in the streets, but his freedom was short-lived.

Later that year, on August 26 2018, Mookey’s released a track [Draco](#), where he rapped about the drive-by shooting that left [Quan Quan](#), [23](#), and [Coby/4](#) dead.

The music video featured Mookey and Slugga flexing with guns.

The two are convicted felons, and investigators combed through every frame, analysing the weapons a firearms expert determined to be glocks- looking to open cases.

Slugga would appear prominently in the music video that had the [lyrics](#):

“Ride got grazed 3 niggas ain’t make it Left a nigga car shaking”

They would both be arrested, charged and sentenced to over 100 days, with Mookey serving his time in prison while Slugga spent his time in a juvenile facility because he was still a minor.

[[Insert Image]] On January 30, 2019, Jacksonville police launched *Operation Rap-Up*.

While the name sounds like a teen drama musical like *Stomp the Yard* or *Step Up*, *Operation Rap-Up* was a full-scale crackdown aimed at taking down members of KTA and Y&R.

Now, it did have teenagers, drama, and music. But instead of settling their beef with a dance off or something silly like that, they did it with the real stuff.

{{Insert Image}} Authorities accused them of using social media and music videos to promote violence, claiming that their lyrics weren't just entertainment but actual confessions tied to real-life crimes.

{{Insert Image}} By the end of the operation, six individuals had been taken into custody - charged with possession of firearms by convicted felons - while three more remained wanted by law enforcement.

As the operation unfolded, {{Insert Image}} Tyler Jackson (Mookey), [19](#), and {{Insert Image}} Tyler Simmons (Slugga), 17, were also caught up in the sweep.

Mookey was charged with possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, while Slugga faced charges for possessing a weapon as a juvenile delinquent with a felony record.

Mookey had already been convicted of having and holding a glock in a different video, and in this one, {{Insert Background Clip from [0:43-0:48](#)}} he would be seen holding a {{Insert Image}} World War 2 looking Zastava gun.

Once again, it was during *Operation Rap Up* {{Insert Background Clip from [0:07-0:10](#) cut to [3:05-3:09](#)}} that Slugga got hit with a weapons charge- this time for the gun seen in the [Draco](#) music video.

Prosecutors framed {{Insert Image}} it as possession of a firearm by a juvenile delinquent who had already been found guilty of a felony act.

Slugga would plead guilty, sentenced to 173 days of jail term served, in addition he would be placed in Community Control, Florida's strictest probation.

Just 2 and a half months later, their luck had officially run dry, and what happened next would ensure they remained behind bars.

On April 9 2020, Jacksonville police pulled over a car that had 4 occupants inside, just after it had left the home of Y&R member, Y&R Slugga Tee.

Behind the wheel was Anthony Hoskins, who goes by the stage name Y&R Amp.

Amp would fumble {{Insert Background Clip from [0:00-0:20](#)}} after being asked for registration and insurance. He had neither.

Officers explained the reason for the stop, and when they asked if there was anything illegal in the vehicle, Y&R Amp denied it.

He also refused consent to a search.

But while the officer ran their IDs for outstanding warrants, the situation took a wild turn- because sitting in the backseat was Tyler Jackson, better known as Y&R Mookey.

And instead of laying low, Mookey decided that it was the perfect time to hop on Instagram Live.

Now, what Mookey didn't know was that the police had a sergeant watching, who specialized in social media surveillance.

In the live recording, the police would hear talk about a gun- this would prompt them to summon a K-9 unit.

Bringing in the K-9 meant that there was probable cause to search the car's occupants.

During the Insta Live, the men in the car could be heard talking, when an officer was heard asking them to step out of the vehicle.

The officers pulled everyone out and got straight to it.

Inside, **{{Insert Image}}** they would find a 9mm Ruger and **{{Insert Image}}** a .40 caliber FN40.

They would all be placed in cuffs, and just as they were finishing up, one of the officers actually jumped onto Mookey's Instagram Live.

{{Insert Background Clip from [0:12-0:30](#)}} All four men were taken downtown, and after some questioning, two of them ended up in cuffs- both confirmed Y&R members, Mookey and Krazy K.

During his interview, Amp would state that he'd driven from Y&R Sluggas house- where Slugga was holed up because of an ankle monitor.

He would be stopped by the police, admitting that he didn't even know the speed limit in the area.

{{(So that is kind of what we would like to discuss with you is obviously you guys were stopped in the vehicle for Speeding, okay? and then during the traffic stop they evolved into the point where there's some things that were found in their car, alright, I got a question.. go ahead; ..um.. Alright I'm going to be honest, I want y'all to be honest with me too.. I wasn't speeding, was I? Let's tell the truth- No you were speeding- you're doing 70 in a 55.. Oh ok.. From this 55 mile an hour sign all the way into the red light you were doing 70 in a 55."}}

When asked about the guns, he claimed he did not own or possess any guns, and had no idea they were in the car.

No.. did you bring a gun from Georgia with you? No.. okay; Since you have been in Jacksonville from Georgia have you acquired a gun? Yeah, but it would've been in my baby momma house. Okay , so It wouldn't have been with you today? No.. Okay"}}

He would consent to having his phone searched and having a DNA swab.

“Ok.. so you don't have an issue with that? No.. Alright.. cool..ok.. See where the X is, sign that.. How do you know Dang.. me..._alright; that's good... would you be willing to give us permission to look at your phone? We would look at it with you and all I'm concerned about is the activity of today with conversations that would suggest you have knowledge of guns in that car_ ok? Do you have a problem with that? No. Ok”}}

And as the interrogation went on, he started changing his story.

Ruthless Amp would eventually admit that Mookey had been sitting in the back and had passed a gun to Krazy K or KeyShun Dillard, who was in the front passenger seat.

Krazy K would then put it on Y&R Amp's lap, as Mookey told him he needed to take the gun charge.

But instead of going along with it, Amp passed it right back, and Krazy K put the gun into the glove box along with a silver firearm.

“Mookie Tyler Jackson so he sat up put a gun in keyshawn's lap.. huh.. and then Keyshawn put that gun in the glove box.. which gun was put in his lap?.. The black one. The black one was put in his lap ,right; was it already folded up in the the bandana it was and it was put in his lap put and then Keyshawn put that one in the glove box and then where did the silver one come from? what I mean was it in his pocket was it in his waistband was it in his shoe I don't know his name_ he was putting the silver one in there but you don't know where he pulled it from? okay”}}

After Hoskins had provided a DNA swab and consent for the phone search, investigators moved on to interviewing his younger brother, Dai'veyon Hoskins- a football player, who was also in the car.

After a fair bit of persuasion from his brother who told him to “tell nothing but the truth”

“Tell the truth, the real truth. What you seen, what you know; they got it on video.. Tell the truth dawg.. not .. not the other bullshit; just tell the truth dawg- they got it on video; remember Mookie went live? They know that. They seen us at Slugga house, they seen us leave Slugga house”}}

Dai'veyon would back up his brother's story, saying Mookey handed off a black firearm wrapped in a white bandana.

But the situation didn't stop there- like his brother, Dai'veyon also agreed to let the investigators swab his mouth for DNA analysis and gave consent to have his phone searched.

 With the two brothers pointing fingers, KeyShun and Mookey were arrested.

 The comment section would explode, with this interrogation being extremely crucial for the investigators.

This is because it led them to Slugga as being a person of interest in the case after multiple videos of Slugga flashing an AR rifle with no stock were found on both phones.

In one, Slugga was inside Amp's car, and in another, he was outside holding the same rifle.

 Y&R Amp would tell the investigators that the videos were recorded at Slugga's house.

He also claimed he thought the rifle was a pellet gun and that it belonged to Slugga's mom.

Then, when police checked Dai'veyon's phone, they found even more videos of Slugga with the same rifle in a bedroom.

Dai'veyon also said he thought the gun was fake.

Meanwhile, Krazy K denied there were ever any guns,

“so now it's time to face the music and accept responsibility.. I had no knowledge of a gun in the car like... you can't even look up and tell us that because you know... how, how's that lying? I'm telling you I'm telling you man I'm telling you... so you're telling me you had no clue there was a gun.. no there was no no gun in no car_ he just came and got me like I don't know.. that's.. listen to me.. that's a bunch of bullshit; you know that all alright, y'all are on live bro talking about a gun the same live that we recorded”

and Mookey lawyered up immediately.

“Best For Last.. No I ain't.. You're not the best? Huh? Why do you say that? I won't listen .. Well I mean I do listen to your music but.. I can call my lawyer? I ain't saying nothing without my lawyer.. Yeah, alright cool; that's fine.. I'll call him; I don't want to waste ya'll time.. yeah we appreciate that man.. We don't want to waste yours either”

A firearms expert from the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office [{{Insert Image}}](#) reviewed the phone footage frame by frame and identified the weapon as a Smith & Wesson AR-15 chambered in .22 long rifle.

He would point out the distinct slotted magazine, which made it clear the gun was real.

[{{Insert Image}}](#) At the time, Slugga was already on community control, Florida's strictest probation, and he had a prior conviction for possession of a firearm by a juvenile; this meant that a gun charge would mean a prison term.

[{{Insert Background Clip from \[0:10-0:20\]\(#\)}}](#) Due to the testimony and videos from the Hoskin brothers, a warrant was issued for his arrest on a second-degree felony charge- possession of a firearm by a gang-related felon.

Imagine [\[insert gif in background in slow-mo\]](#) the look on Slugga's face when he sees the cops arresting him for being on someone else's phone. You can't make this up.

It gets worse because that charge alone carries up to 15 years, with a mandatory minimum of three years in jail.

But with the gang enhancement, prosecutors could push it to a first-degree felony, bumping the max to 30 years.

Slugga's defense managed to get the gang enhancement dropped, but the case still went to trial.

In a [letter by the state attorney dated December 6, 2021](#), it states that Y&R Slugga was found guilty of possession of a firearm, violating his community control.

[{{Insert Image}}](#) A few months later, Slugga Tee was convicted and sentenced to seven years in prison in March 2022- just a month before Mookey's sentence.

Mookey on the other hand, [{{Insert Image}}](#) would be found guilty of Possession of a Firearm by a Juvenile Delinquent Found to Have Committed a Felony Act.

And even after that, he'll still have to complete three years of probation.

If all goes as scheduled, according to records, he'll be walking [{{Insert Image}}](#) out of the halfway house on 21st September, 2026.

But his time inside hasn't been smooth sailing- far from it.

Court records [{{Insert Image}}](#) reveal that he'd been targeted in a racially motivated attack where he was stabbed, and continued to receive threats while he was locked up.
