What is the day in the life like at your job?

My job consists of working with over 500 members that are a part of the Dyersburg/Dyer County Chamber of Commerce. These are businesses of every caliber located in West/Northwest Tennessee. A typical day on the job consists of phone calls or emails, requesting the distribution of any given business or member's latest advertisement or event. In addition to these tasks, I am in charge of developing inclusive campaigns encouraging community involvement and posting to all social media platforms. The latest of these is a 'Support Local' Sticker Decal Campaign, which involves photos of community members/businesses placing 5" stickers on their businesses' door to show they are participating and encouraging you to support all local businesses.

What do you love about your job?

I love that my job allows me to talk to such a large variety of businesses and people every single day. Two days are never the same, and it keeps my job exciting.

What is challenging about your role?

As much as I love speaking with so many different types of

businesses on a daily basis, it's a constant challenge to learn and adapt to who I'm talking to. For example I am not a doctor, so it's important for me to prepare before engaging in conversation with a doctor so I can better identify his/her needs throughout the conversation.

What are the benefits of working in this field?

The greatest benefit of working in this field is getting to make so many connections within the community. Dyer County seems small, but we have an immense population of educated and well connected individuals, so it is a huge benefit to have a job that puts me into conversations with business owners, community leaders, and volunteers, that I may not have had the chance to speak with so closely before being in this role.

What experiences did you have that prepared you for this role?

I worked for an attorney's office in Dyersburg during high school, where my job consisted of running errands to several different establishments gathering records for any of the given attorneys in the office. This was the first hint that I enjoyed being out and about, communicating with different professionals. In college, I worked for First Citizens National Bank where I continued to build on local connections. This experience expanded beyond

Dyer County. As FirstCNB expanded throughout the state, I had the opportunity to work in several of the different branches throughout the state. This only peaked my interest of working with a variety of businesses, as every business and person uses a bank. This also helped to create and expand connections throughout West Tennessee to better prepare me for life after college. My last two years of college I worked in the event industry in Nashville where I had the opportunity to work with talented planners and vendor to conduct a wide variety of events. This only built on my love of working with people in different fields, so I knew I was entering into the right position with the chamber after graduation.

What do you see happening in the future for these types of careers?

If a community utilizes their chamber of commerce for all that it can offer, I believe a community will continue to thrive. However, I see the individual's ability to market themselves is only increasing, and eventually it will be hard to justify a membership fee for some businesses to a non-profit such as a chamber. What should a student know about your field?

I never imagined graduating and working for a non-profit. It is extremely challenging because the gist of my job consists of 'selling' the vision we strive to make happen for the community, and convincing businesses and individuals that it is worth their time and money to invest in us. Particularly during difficult economic struggles that we have faced this year, someone's contribution to a non-profit is sometimes the first thing that comes to mind for them to drop. Making community members feel important, communicated with, and valued, is something to always keep in mind if you plan to work for a community based organization.

What advice do you have for a student considering a career in your profession?

Be prepared to hear the word, "no." I am very much a "yes" person, so this was a little bit of a challenge for me to overcome. Some people will never find what you're doing important, and you just have to move on and focus on the ones that do.
