Shakespeare's Life and Times: A Critical Annotation

This website presents a brief chronological overview of Shakespeare's life, beginning with his birth on April 23, 1564—the piece notes that “he was baptized [at Holy Trinity Church] on April 26, 1564,” (Pressley, “Shakespeare's Biography”) leaving scholars to conclude that his birthday was a few days earlier. The piece highlights his major life events, including Shakespeare's marriage, the birth of his three children, and his critical success as an actor, playwright, and entrepreneur. The article notes that “While Shakespeare might not be accounted wealthy by London standards, his success allowed him to purchase New House and retire in comfort to Stratford in 1611” (Pressley, “Shakespeare's Biography”). The site is copyrighted 1997-2014 by the author, J. M. Pressley, who holds a B.F.A. in Theatre Arts and an M.A. in writing from DePaul University in Chicago, Illinois, and has maintained the Shakespeare Resource Center since 1997, after he conceived it for a class in technical writing as part of his master's studies, to concentrate “the most useful links on Shakespeare around the World Wide Web” (Pressley, “About the SRC”). Given that he has maintained the website for nearly 20 years and displays an obvious passion for theatre and

Shakespeare, this seems to be a credible source. Further, Pressley acknowledges the limitations of what scholars know about Shakespeare, even questioning some Wikipedia-esque facts (such as his established date of birth). This source helped me understand both what is actually known about Shakespeare and what remains a mystery, and I learned a little more about his early life and schooling as a young child from the records that Pressley presents.
