Course Description and Goals

In this course, students apply knowledge gained in previous years of humanities-based study to pursue a deeper understanding of American government. They will consider the role of and necessity for the government as they contemplate how much power the government should have over its citizens. Students will consider how the government can accomplish goals sanctioned by the majority while still protecting its citizens from the abuse of power. Students will expand their knowledge of the key elements of our representative form of democracy, such as the idea that the authority to govern resides in its citizens and the understanding that all citizens have certain inalienable rights. This course is the culmination of the civic literacy strand of history-social studies that prepares students to vote, and to be informed, skilled, and engaged participants in civic life; as well as the benefits of democracy resulting in an electorate willing to compromise, practice genuine tolerance and respect of others, and actively engage in an ethical and civil society. They'll discover that all citizens have the power to elect and change their representatives —a power protected by free speech, thought, and assembly guarantees. Through this course of study students will be empowered to participate in the civic life of their community, state, and nation, and the various ways that they can access and participate in the governing of their country.

State Seal of Civic Engagement: On September 10, 2020, the State Board of Education (SBE) adopted criteria and guidance to award a State Seal of Civic Engagement (SSCE) to California students who demonstrate excellence in civic education and participation, and an understanding of the United States Constitution, the California Constitution, and the democratic system of government. Students may begin working on the SSCE criteria in grade 9 and must meet all criteria by the end of the first semester in grade 12. Seals will be awarded in grades 11 or 12 and may be affixed to a diploma, certificate of completion, or transcript. Criteria include: Criteria 1: Academics, Criteria 2: Government Knowledge, Criteria 3: Civic Engagement, Criteria 4: Self-Reflection, and Criteria 5: Character. More information to come.
