# A Tale of Two Cities Historical Information, Reading Schedule, Writing Prompt

- A Tale of Two Cities published serially in 1859.
- Historical novel (French Revolution) set in 18th century London and Paris.
- 1757-1794: The Period Represented in the Novel
  - o begins in 1770 with Doctor Manette's release from the Bastille and ends in late 1793/ early 1794
  - the story as a whole covers a much broader period. In the larger view, the novel begins in 1757 (the year of Doctor Manette's incarceration under the ancien régime) and its final scene anticipates a post-revolutionary Paris.
- However, as a historical novel organized around the events of the French Revolution (1789-1794)
  - major historical events of the revolutionary period in France
    - the fall of the Bastille (July 14, 1789) American Revolution ended 1783
    - neighborhood of St. Antoine
    - the September Massacres (September 2-6, 1792)
    - and the Reign of Terror (1793-1794).
  - minor historical details/events
    - First; Ch 2: highway robberies
    - Second; Ch 2: Old Bailey (Tyburn court for treason)
    - allusions to the American Revolution (Dickens had many American readers.)
    - Damiens was drawn and guartered for attacking King Louis XV
    - The beheading of Foulon ("Let them eat grass.")
    - etc.
