- 3. How do the issues within these articles relate to "Fantine" (book one) in Les Miserables?
- 4. Do you think there is a way for our character(s) in *Les Mis* to escape from the discrimination that they face? Why or why not?

- 1. Why is Jean Valjean turned away from housing at the beginning of the novel? Do we have the same type of discrimination is our society today? Use evidence to support opinion.

"Fantine" Book Search Group Activity--due 1/11

- -An analysis of the effect of the literary device or motif (should be longer than a sentence)
- -A prediction on how this literary device or motif will affect the novel as a whole (should be longer than a sentence)
- -An illustration that demonstrates/represents the literary device/motif
