Sample email script for requesting video captions:

Hello! I'm [NAME, PRONOUNS], a big fan of your [CHANNEL/ORGANIZATION/VIDEOS/CONTENT].

I want to recommend your content to my [FRIENDS/STUDENTS/COLLEAGUES/CLIENTS, etc.], but I'm committed to sharing **accessible** video content with accurate captions.

Captions are crucial for making videos accessible, especially for:

- d/Deaf and hard of hearing folks
- English language learners
- Those with auditory processing difficulties or other cognitive disabilities

With your platform, you have the opportunity to set an inclusive and accessible example for others. \bigcirc

The YouTube video is auto-captioned, but we still have to edit these, as "auto-**crap**tions" are not fully accessible or <u>ADA compliant</u>. You can pay for captioning/remediation through companies like <u>Rev</u> or divide up sections among a small team to make editing less time-consuming. <u>YouTube provides instructions for how to create and edit captions here</u>.

Another option is Otter Ai captioning (there's a **free** tier). Otter auto-generates transcripts from live speech or audio recordings, which can easily be edited for accuracy. There's a "collaborate" option to allow multiple folks to help edit. Transcripts can then be exported as an SRT file and uploaded to YouTube or other video platforms to become auto-synced captions.

[ACADEMICS: People with disabilities constantly face systemic ableism in higher ed, digital spaces, and society at large. I love this <u>Inventory of Apologies</u> piece that explains how d/Deaf folks in particular need accurate captions to participate in academia.]

One time-saving tip: use "Find" and "Replace" to fix predictable and recurring Al mistakes.

***Providing captions will also boost your SEO prioritization. Accessibility is a win-win!
