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Practices in Proximity Exhibition Showcases the Work of Teaching Artists& the Influence of Their Role as Teachers on Their Art This September

What does it mean to be a teaching artist, an artist who is dedicated not only to making art but to arts education? And what does it look like to take the experience of being someone who teaches others about art and apply it to your own art-making? The *Practices in Proximity* exhibition, hosted by <u>Chicago Arts Partnerships in Education (CAPE)</u>, explores these questions, bringing together more than twenty CAPE teaching artists and invited creative practitioners into a dialogue about their pedagogical experiences.

Details: The sites, scenes, and social engagement of learning—whether formal, informal, institutional, or autonomous—inevitably impact how artists negotiate collective spaces and consider their personal creativity. As the works featured in this exhibition show, artistic teaching and learning is an experience defined by proximity to others, one that necessitates improvisation and uncertainty.

This exhibition brings together work in a rich variety of disciplines, including movement works, installations, and video, performance, and textile art. Together, the works speak to the kind of community and collaboration that results when artists are actively engaged in teaching others. Examples include miniatures made by incarcerated individuals at Stateville Prison; video work that explores ideas around immigration and public space; and a selection of notes transformed into tufted rug works. There are also participatory works that bring the artistic learning process to the space and invite attendees to engage in making their own art.
