Rooted in ancient prophecies and the resurgence of Indigenous leadership, this phase focuses on six interwoven priorities that will empower Indigenous communities, rebuild sustainable economies, and elevate Indigenous governance.

- a) Declaration for Action co-created at the Indigenous Action Summit, March 18-23, 2025

We share the Declaration for Action, co-created at the Indigenous Action Summit from March 18 to 23, 2025. We recognize in this expression of collective intelligence a foundation of alignment, service, and dialogue that nourishes the implementation of the 25-year Community Development Plan for unity in Abya Yala. The declaration speaks to this plan and lays the groundwork for follow-up work through projects, actions, and initiatives that support the indigenous peoples of Abya Yala and their allies.

From the sacred Gardens of the Golden Hummingbird, in the living land of Sisbichén, Yucatán, we raise our voices and spirits to declare our commitment to walking the path of unity within ABYA YALA. This declaration for action emerges from the **Indigenous Summit for Action: Eagle, Condor, Quetzal, Hummingbird**, where we, as Indigenous peoples and allies, stand together to weave a shared vision for the future of humanity, grounded in ancestral wisdom and the recognition of our interdependence.

We recognize ourselves as children of a shared ancestral lineage, guardians of balance, and sowers of a shared vision for the future. This declaration is a living document, an ongoing work in progress that welcomes and honors contributions from all who share this vision We acknowledge that the dialogue for agreements has been essential, and we recognize that several contracts are not yet entirely in place here. We share this declaration as a way to give momentum to the spirit of unity, with a commitment to continue weaving new understandings and collaborations as they emerge. If more agreements are needed, let us join our voices to continue building together.

We share these agreements and visions, honoring the sacred ceremony of the pipes, which were present from the very beginning to the end of our gathering. These sacred pipes bore silent witness to all that unfolded — the expansions and the contractions — expressions of a path of learning that may be honored, received, and carried forward with reverence. Carried by pipe carriers representing the Condor, the Eagle, the Quetzal, and the Hummingbird — messengers of the South, the North, the

Center, and the delicate thread of beauty that weaves us together — their presence reminded us of the sacredness of our agreements. Through them, Spirit was invited to guide, hold, and illuminate our shared journey toward unity and collective purpose.

Our words emerge from the deep roots of the Maya bioregions, lands where the memory of water, the jungle, and corn teach us to flourish in community. We reclaim the teachings of our elders, who remind us that the path is built through listening, respect, and the sacred covenant with the Earth. As ancestral wisdom guides us, we see beyond the immediate, honoring the cycles of time, and restoring the balance between heaven and earth.

Through bioregionalism, we recognize the interconnectedness of the Maya bioregions with those across Asia, Africa, Europe, Turtle Island, and South America. The shared wisdom and the profound interconnection between these lands allow us to weave agreements that transcend borders, embracing the common good of our planet and its peoples.

We also recognize in **Ecumenism** the honor of bridging the **Crystal Rainbow Bridge**, working with youth, and continuing to unite paths through a shared spirituality.

This work of unity strengthens our collective vision and guides us toward a future rooted in the interconnectedness of all beings.

With this spirit, we move forward with strength and heart, guided by **four fundamental pillars**:

Prophecy – Honoring the ancient prophecies that guide our journey, reminding us of our interconnected destiny and the importance of our collective actions.

Unity – Embracing the strength in our shared vision, knowing that we can transcend barriers and build a future grounded in harmony and respect.

Service – Committing to serve the Earth and each other, knowing that we find purpose, heal, and restore balance through service.

Love – Holding love as the foundation of all our work, the energy that binds us, strengthens us, and inspires the transformation we seek for all beings.

- Shared Economy: Promoting a system of trade where goods and services are exchanged directly between communities, based on mutual respect and the collective good.
- Preserving Local Medicines and Cultures: Ensuring that external influences do not damage or exploit the traditions and medicines of local cultures.
- International Treaties for Indigenous Sovereignty:
 Continuing the work on international treaties that uphold the rights and territories of Indigenous peoples, independent of government permissions, and acting on them with the full force of ancestral wisdom.
- Defending and Rescuing Mayan Culture: Taking concrete actions to preserve and protect Mayan culture, ensure it is not commodified, and foster genuine community engagement.

 Restoring Trust: Healing the wounds of colonial processes by creating teams between locals and organizers to honor traditional protocols and build trust through community-level meetings.

AGREEMENTS from the Unity of Grandmothers and Mothers Circle

- We agree to heal the wounded womb. We heal the old wounds we carry as women, which absorb our energy and lead to emotional, mental, physical, and spiritual imbalances, so that we can form and guide future generations who are healthy, free, and empowered.
- We will begin holding weekly Zoom meetings to plan concrete actions that awaken women to a new consciousness and to perform rituals and/or prayers together, aligned with love, forgiveness, inclusion, and the attributes of the Divine Mother.
- We agree to support the Red Tent Jubilee, which begins on May 12.

- We agree that women who serve as a conduit for the Divine Mother have the responsibility to unite and lead actions in their communities, countries, and on the planet, contributing to the establishment of the Divine Mother's consciousness and the manifestation of supreme peace.
- We women agree to unite and support one another on the path, each of us assuming responsibility for our own personal and individual healing and awakening.

AGREEMENTS from the Ecumenism and Bridging Continents Circle

 Eagle and Condor Collaboration: Practicing the collaboration between the Eagle and the Condor as part of making the vision of Ancestral United Nations concrete, connecting communities across regions such as Tibet-Nepal, Ghana, New York, Germany, the Kingdom of Thailand, Kenya, Bali, the Netherlands, Panama, and Mexico.

- Documentary Collaboration: Collaborating on developing documentaries to showcase the work in these regions and seeking funding to support these efforts.
- Spiritual and Cultural Bridges: Using Meshwoking and other tools to build spiritual bridges that transcend geographic and cultural boundaries, uniting diverse spiritual traditions and communities.

AGREEMENTS from the Art, Culture, and Digital Platforms Circle

- Art as Transformation: Creating and preserving artworks that honor reconciliation and forgiveness, such as the "Manta Viajera," made with clay from the Maya territories, which carries prayers related to healing and cultural renewal.
- Cultural Storytelling: Ensuring that the stories behind the artwork are told and presented to honor the cultural roots and intentions behind the creation.
- Virtual Learning Platform: Creating a shared online space to host and distribute talks, workshops, talking

circles, and educational content from Indigenous knowledge keepers and allies. The platform will extend the reach of our collective wisdom to wider communities, offering modest, fee-based participation options that provide a sustainable income for network participants, interpreters, Elders, and community leaders. This approach respects language diversity and cultural protocols while making ancestral teachings more accessible to support our shared vision.

We discern where we shall meet again, during the next **Ancestral Equinox Meeting**, as we continue our work together. We will hold online meetings as part of our discernment and preparation for the next gathering, ensuring ongoing dialogue and collaboration.

We recognize that this expression of collective intelligence aligns deeply with a 25-Year Community Development Plan for Abya Yala (2025–2050), sourced from community consultation processes that have been ongoing since 1982, as explained in the document. In its first stage, spanning nine years, the plan outlines six

strategic pillars for what it calls "the Indigenous Renaissance":

- Governance and Sovereignty
- 2. Regenerative Economy and Financial Sovereignty
- 3 Environment and Resilience
- 4 Culture, Spirituality, and Languages
- 5 Indigenous Education
- 6 Spiritual Diplomacy and Strategic Alliances

These pillars are grounded in key principles such as:

- Sacred Sovereignty
- The Regeneration of Life
- Interdependence
- Service to Future Generations
- Unity in Diversity

Alongside these, other community development plans propose pathways toward unification, and they will also be considered as we integrate visions and missions into our shared journey.

We wish to especially honor the wisdom keepers — the grandmothers and grandfathers, the carriers of ancestral knowledge from diverse Indigenous traditions — who came in person to the sacred Gardens of the Golden Hummingbird. With deep gratitude, we thank each of you, your traditions, and your communities. We honor the

presence of the many Indigenous Nations who gathered for this 2025 Encounter, and we speak your names from a place of reverence and heartfelt recognition:
