


About United Against Hate Week

United Against Hate Week (Nov. 13-19th, 2022) is a call for seven days of local civic action by people in every community to stop the hate and implicit biases that are a dangerous threat to the safety and civility of our neighborhoods, towns, and cities.

United Against Hate was created by civic leaders in direct response to the sharp rise in expressions of hate in our communities. We want to empower local residents to take action in their local communities and alter the course of this growing intolerance.

When cities and their residents work together against hate, we can restore respect and civil discourse, embrace the strength of diversity and build inclusive and equitable communities for all.

Activities

Elementary

- <u>United Against Hate Coloring Book</u> The coloring book features images that promote
 equality, respect, and reject hate. Download and share with students and let their
 creativity shine by having them color in the images and hang them in their classroom.
- Host a Mix It Up Day in your school cafeteria to help address cliques In places such as schools cafeterias where division among students can clearly be seen, Mix It Up is a low-stakes opportunity where students are mixed into groups and given activities that allow them to cross social boundaries and get to know one another.
- Host a Unity Day Show you care about students being bullied. Wear orange, link


Film Screening and Discussion
