In-depth Officer Responsibilities & Duties

Executive Branch

President

A responsible leader of the Senate who:

- 1. Acts as the Executive Prime⁵, leader, and mentor over the entirety of the HS Senate;
- 2. Takes a position of leadership during full-senate meetings, chairing them in a respectful and orderly fashion in correspondence with the weekly agenda;
- Assumes responsibility for ensuring that all members and their respective ideas and voices are equally represented and considered when partaking in meetings or discussions:
- 4. Moderates the progress of both committees and may assume control over either group where necessary;
- 5. Behaves as a role model not only for Senators but the wider community;
- 6. Controls the weather.

Vice President of Student Representation (VPSR)

A vocal and engaged Senator and leader who:

- Takes a position of leadership during the meetings for the Student Representatives, chairing them in a respectful and orderly fashion in correspondence with the agenda;
- 2. Works closely with the student body and works to constantly improve the school community through a number of ways;
- Acts as the voice of the Senate to the administration and the student body. This
 includes serving as primary contact person for The Flame and any other news
 agencies;
- 4. Is ready to take leadership responsibility for the President alongside the Events Coordinator, if the former is absent.

Vice President of Events (VPE)

A highly organised Senator and leader who:

- 1. Takes a position of leadership during the meetings for the Events Committee, chairing them in a respectful and orderly fashion in correspondence with the agenda:
- 2. Plans, organizes, and keeps track of all the main high school events of the year;
- 3. May enact the Total Events Protocol⁶ with consent from the Executive branch, which expands leadership to the entirety of the Senate in order to organise larger events;
- 4. Is ready to take leadership responsibility for the President alongside the Student Representatives Coordinator, if the former is absent.

Communications Branch

Communications Officer of Events (COE)

A creative, organized, and intuitive Senator who:

- 1. Plays the lead role, in cooperation with COSR, in promoting the Senate to the student body by maintaining Senate information portals such as, but not limited to:
 - a. The main Facebook page,
 - b. The Senate bulletin board,
 - c. The Senate website;
- 2. Publicizes Senate events using various forms of media;
- 3. Assumes the role of second-in-command to the VPE, in order to assist in the execution of Senate events.

Communications Officer of the Student Representatives (COSR)

A Senator who:

- 1. Plays the lead role, in cooperation with COE, in promoting the Senate to the student body by maintaining Senate information portals such as, but not limited to:
 - a. The main Facebook page,
 - b. The Senate bulletin board,
 - c. The Senate website;
- 2. Plays the lead role in managing the Morning Meeting agenda and logistics;
- 3. Recruits and equips Masters of Ceremony (MCs) with the relevant information to perform their duties;
- Supervises the Morning Meetings and ensures the fluency and quality of proceedings, assuming the equivalent role of stage manager to the Morning Meetings;
- 5. Assumes the role of second-in-command to the VPSR, in order to assist in the maintenance of representative duties.

Secretarial Branch

Secretaries (SSR & SE)

Two reliable and organized Senators, each under their respective committees, who:

- 1. Meeting organisation:
 - Record minutes for their respective committees and full-Senate meetings, which are to be found available to all Senators for future reference on a shared domain, such as the Google Drive;
 - b. Keep attendance and manages other organisational details relevant to the Senate proceedings;
- 2. Treasury:
 - a. Monitor and are aware of the Senate's annual budget;
 - b. Authorize, document, and monitor all transactions, deposits, and withdrawals to and from the Senate account, co-signed by the Senate supervisors;

c. Present a summary of all financial transactions at the conclusion of each school year.

Committees

Overall Purpose & Duties

Student Representatives (SRs)

A group of highly open-minded, observant, and aware Senators that:

- 1. Listens to the suggestions of the student body and brings the issue to the attention of the rest of the Senate during each meeting;
- 2. Works cooperatively to turn suggestions of the student body into a reality;
- 3. Always takes initiative in looking for ways to improve the high school life of the student body;
- 4. Acts as a communication channel between students and faculty;
- 5. Has regular meetings with school administration to implement changes and consider school-related issues:
- 6. Helps out with the Members of the Events Committee on large events under the Total Events Protocol;
- 7. Directs students with concerns about teachers in the following procedure⁷:
 - a. Ask the student to talk directly to the teacher to figure out the problem and the solution;
 - b. If step (a) does not work, ask the student to talk to counselor;
 - c. If step (a) and (b) does not work, help the student to schedule a meeting with the principle in order to sort out the problem.

Members of the Events Committee (MECs)

A group of highly creative and organized Senators that:

- 1. Works cooperatively with each other to plan, publicize, and carry out current and upcoming high school events;
- 2. Documents the outcomes of events for future reference:
- 3. Listens to the needs and wants of the student body in terms of events;
- 4. Molds events for the high school student body to fit the orders of promoting student life, and high school spirit.

Specific Responsibilities

Events Committee

- 1. Movie Nights
- 2. Spirit Weeks

Student Representatives⁸

- 1. Attend regular administration meetings
- 2. Organise and facilitate regular HS Morning Meetings
- 3. Listen to & act upon student suggestions
- 4. Provide communication channel between students & faculty
- 5. Any other non-event initiatives

Combined (under TEP)

- 1. High School Day
- 2. Prom
- 3. MSHS Talent Show
- 4. Extended HS Assemblies

Systems & Procedures

Total Events Protocol (TEP)

The Total Events Protocol may be enacted by the VPE with consent from the Executive branch. The purpose is to focus all Senate resources on a single event, maximizing the available manpower. TEP can be enacted for the duration of an event, after the completion of which the Senate will resume normal activity.

Under TEP, the following changes are implemented:

- 1. The SR committee merges with the EC to form a full Senate, which will meet as a group when necessary.
- 2. This full-senate meeting will be chaired by the VPE and co-chaired by the President, assuming full responsibility & management of Senate activity during this time.
- 3. The VPSR will retain Executive power over the SR committee, however will act under the guidance of the VPE.

Officer Assignment Procedures

The procedures for officer assignments vary depending on the position in question⁹, however all elections should follow the following general procedures:

1. Senators who meet the formal qualifications may nominate themselves for a maximum of one position per round of assignments.¹⁰

- 2. Assignments will proceed in a staggered fashion, allowing failed nominees to run for another officer position of a lower tier, if they so desire.
- 3. For positions that are appointed:
 - a. Nominees are expected to provide a short (200 words max) personal statement for the Executive branch, along with the new president and the teacher supervisors, to consider.
 - b. The Executives may request an interview with nominees where necessary.
 - c. The list of all candidates for appointment will be publicized to the whole Senate, and there shall be a public opinion period. All comments concerning candidates will be confidential.
 - d. The Executives, new president and teacher supervisors will then decide on the most fitting candidate, and inform this person of the decision.
 - e. In the event that an Executive is returning the next year and wishes to attempt to extend their term, an election is held within their respective committee, instead of appointment.
- 4. For positions that are elected:
 - a. Nominees must sign up as candidates before the deadline, as set by the Executives. Late nominations may or may not be considered at the Executives' discretion.
 - b. In a dedicated session, candidates will be asked to perform a short (2-3 minute) speech to their respective committee.
 - c. The relevant committee will then proceed to an online, anonymous vote outlining their first, second and third choice (where applicable). The voting survey will be moderated by the teacher supervisors, as well as any non-running Executive officers.
 - d. After having reviewed the voting polls, the newly elected officers will be informed of the decision.
- 5. In addition, for newly-assigned Executive officers:
 - a. The chosen candidates will be asked to perform a short (1-2 minute) speech in front of the whole Senate, outlining their commitment to the group and their general vision for the future.
 - b. The Senate will then hold inaugural speeches, affirming the new officers into their role.

Annual Senate Election Procedures

Members of the Events Committee (MECs)

The Events Committee is dedicated to organisation and publicizing all senate-initiated school events, and therefore require a capable and well-organised group of students. With this in mind, Members of the Events Committee (MECs) are appointed by the returning officer board through an application process, as follows:

 Nominees may fill out an online application form as provided by the returning officers, including responses to a number of questions relevant to the candidate's organisational ability, experience and the responsibilities required from an MEC. This

- application must be submitted by the given deadline, and late applications may or may not be considered at the discretion of the returning officers.
- 2. After all applications have been submitted, the returning officers will read through all of them and meet to discuss the most qualified candidates from each grade level (2 from each). Emphasis will be put not only on past experience, but also on creative passion and an eagerness to contribute.
- 3. The results will be announced once all choices have been made. Unsuccessful candidates may run for the position of Student Representative for a second chance at making it into the Senate.

Student Representatives (SRs)

The Student Representatives Committee is dedicated to act as a communications channel and means of representation for the student body. With this in mind, Student Representatives are elected at the beginning of each school year by their respective grade levels through means of a simple democratic vote as follows:

- 1. Nominees must sign-up for candidacy before the given deadline. Late submissions may or may not be accepted.
- 2. In a dedicated X-block session, each candidate may make a short speech of three minutes maximum in length to his/her respective grade level.
- 3. Immediately after the speeches, a voting form will be sent out upon which students may vote for 2 candidates whom they feel will fulfill the role of SR best.
- 4. Results will be announced after all votes have been processed.

The election procedure, including management of the relevant sign-up and voting forms and the facilitation of the speaking session will be moderated by the returning Senate officers along with the Senate teacher supervisors.

The SR elections will happen after the events committee assignments have been completed, meaning EC candidates not selected will have a chance to run for SR as well.

Confidentiality Policy

While the Senate promotes the value of transparency and boasts a positive cooperation with The Flame and other school news organisations, all senators are under strict confidentiality obligations. These obligations are as follows:

- 1. Any non-Executive senator should refrain from publicizing any information from within Senate meetings that is not already public knowledge, unless given permission to do so by an Executive officer¹¹.
- 2. When in doubt about the nature of certain information, senators should refer to an Executive officer for clarification before publicizing it.

3. When asked to be interviewed by The Flame or any other news agency, the Senator may do so (with regard to clauses 1 and 2), however must inform an Executive member of this interview at the soonest possible opportunity.

The HS Senate is dedicated to serve the student body, however bears a responsibility to respect the privacy rights of others, as well as keeping sensitive matters confidential. In order to ensure the continued trust and respect of the Senate within the school community, this policy is essential.

Amending the Constitution

The Constitution is a democratic document; amendments and changes must be placed through the following process:

- 1. The suggestion of an amendment is submitted to the Executives.
- 2. In cooperation with the teacher supervisors, the amendment is drafted.
- 3. The amendment is voted upon and only passed through a unanimous vote.
