

- **good to see you could make it** : happy to see you could come
 - It's really good to see you could make it.
- **full swing** (*idiom*): at its high point
 - The party really got into full swing around midnight.
- **eat someone out of house and home** (*idiom*): they're eating all of my food
 - My teenagers have huge appetites and are eating me out of house and home.
- **hit it off** (*idiom*): get along well
 - My roommate and I hit it off from the very first day we moved in.
- **outgoing** (*adjective*): very friendly and sociable
 - He is very outgoing and always makes newcomers feel comfortable at a party.
- **adventurous** (*adjective*): willingness to try new things
 - If I were more adventurous, I think I would try mountain climbing.
- **flashy** (*adjective*): brightly colored or unusually decorated beyond normal standards
 - She tends to wear flashy ski wear during the winter season.
- **Get ahead : become successful in life**
- **Make something of myself**
- **Check-out counter**: at the cashier: count money, pay bill
- **whip something up** (*verb*): prepare quickly
 - Let's whip something up for tonight's party. A few games and some snacks should be fine.
- **lineman** (*noun*): a player in the front line of a team
 - One of the lineman from their team is very big, but quick, on the field.
- **book** (*verb*): to make arrangements in advance
 - You ought to book a room at least a month in advance.
- "sleep on it" = wait until tomorrow to make a decision
- "She wanted to sleep on it before making such an important decision."
- "gift of gab" = skill of interesting conversation
- "not your cup of tea" = not be the kind of thing you like
- **knockout** (*noun*): a very attractive or beautiful woman
 - Hey, you'll love her roommate. She's a real knockout, and she isn't dating anyone.
- **rebate** (*noun*): a refund of part of all of the amount paid
 - The company offers a fifty-dollar rebate on the purchase of a new cellphone.

- "kick back" = relax

Memento(N)= souvenir.

Condolence(n) : chia buồn e.g: my sincerest condolence goes out to you and your family.

Eulogy (n): bai phat bieu tuong nho nguoi chet e.g: give an eulogy

"**in a pickle**" = a difficult situation "You'll find yourself in a real pickle if you don't have enough water during an emergency."

"**hang loose**" = relax or stay calm "Tell the people to hang loose until help arrives."

"**wacky**" = silly or foolish "My brother had the wacky idea of packing twenty bottles of ketchup in his emergency kit instead of water."

"**make your mouth water**" = make you hungry by just looking at or smelling food "I'm so hungry that just looking at the fruit makes my mouth water."

"**easy as pie**" = not difficult or requiring much effort "Making delicious cookies is easy as pie."

go on (phrasal verb): getting near to, almost

- It's going on 6:00 p.m., so we'd better start dinner before the guests arrive.

out (adjective): not acceptable or possible

- Going to the movie is out tonight. We don't have enough money to pay for the tickets.

spinach (noun): a dark green leafy vegetable

- Some kids don't like the taste of spinach.

"sick as a dog" = very sick "She has been sick as a dog for a week, and she really needs to see a doctor."

"run down" = very tired and exhausted

"Jeff is feeling run down, so he decided not to come to the party."

- **stuffy (adjective):** closed or blocked
 - I have a really stuffy nose and can't breathe very well.

- **be supposed to** (*verb*): expected to do something
 - She was supposed to stay in bed and rest, but she went to work instead.
- **stay off your feet** (*idiom*): rest
 - If you want to get better, you have to stay off your feet for a few days.
- **drag** (*noun*): something that is really annoying
 - Driving with my parents is such a drag because they are back-seat drivers---always telling me what to do.
- **drowsy** (*adjective*): sleepy
 - You need to pull the car over and rest if you start to feel drowsy.
