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Abstract: Type your abstract here. Abstract of a research paper can typically ranges from 250 to 400 words, while for a review paper, it can be between 175 and 300 words. Abstract should be unstructured (without headings and citations). Abbreviations should be spelled out in full the first time they appear, after which they can be used in parentheses.

Keywords: keyword 1; keyword 2; keyword 3 (List three to seven pertinent keywords specific to the article yet reasonably common within the subject discipline.)

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The introduction should briefly place the study in a broad context and highlight why it is important. It should define the purpose of the work and its significance. The current state of the research field should be carefully reviewed and key publications cited. Please highlight controversial and diverging hypotheses when necessary. Finally, briefly mention the main aim of the work and highlight the principal conclusions. As far as possible, please keep the introduction comprehensible to scientists outside your particular field of research. References should be numbered in order of appearance and indicated by a numeral or numerals in square brackets—e.g., [1] or [2,3], or [4–6]. See the end of the document for further details on references.

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In the literature review section, authors should critically analyze and synthesize existing research relevant to their topic, identifying key themes, gaps, and trends. This section should provide a clear context for the study, demonstrating how the current research builds upon or diverges from previous work.

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The publication of your manuscript implicates that you must make all materials, data, computer code, and protocols associated with the publication available to readers OR authors should clearly

describe the research design, data collection methods, and analysis techniques used to conduct the study. Please disclose at the submission stage any restrictions on the availability of materials or information. New methods and protocols should be described in detail while well-established methods can be briefly described and appropriately cited.

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Interventionary studies involving animals or humans, and other studies that require ethical approval, must list the authority that provided approval and the corresponding ethical approval code.

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4.1. Subsection

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All figures and tables should be cited in the main text as Figure 1, Table 1, etc.

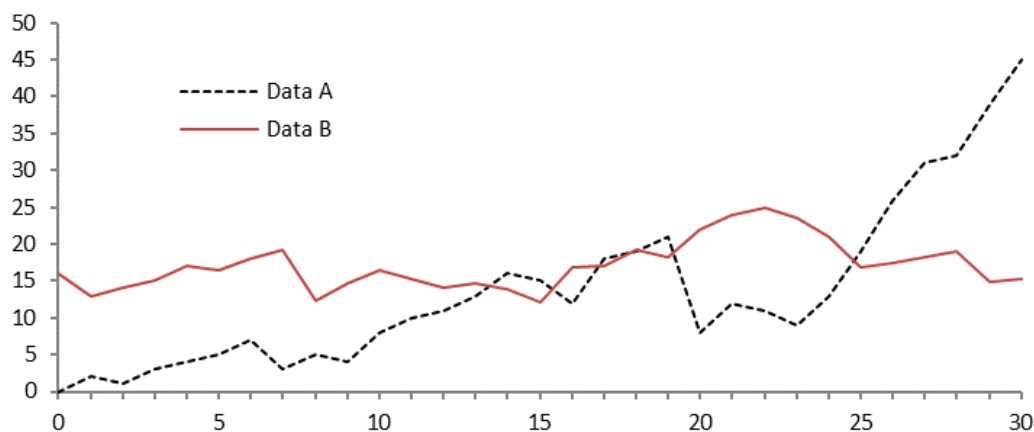

The findings and their implications should be discussed in the broadest context possible. Future research directions may also be highlighted.
