

Social 10-1 Source Analysis Assignment (Images)

Primary Learning Outcomes

- Do I understand the basic meaning of political cartoons, information graphics & their relation to social studies 10-1?
- Can I interpret what the artist/author(s) is trying to state in my own words so that I can explain these cartoons to other students?

Step 1: Take an initial scan of what information the source presents (larger size available in class/website). Record your initial impressions

Step 2: Deconstruct the source through a series of questions:

1. Where or when is the source taking place?
2. What issue or event is your source based on?
3. What symbols can be found in your source and what do they represent?
4. What opinion or message is the author of the source trying to express?
5. What is the tone of the carton? (ironic, satiric, humorous, factual) Explain.
6. Identify what terms/concepts from Social Studies relate to the source.

What message does this sources present about the impact of globalization on identity? /20 (*rubric below*)

Step 3: Using the information from steps 1 & 2 answer the following question in a written response

A. EXPLORATION OF THE ISSUE – 5marks

- Define the issue
- Discuss the importance of the issue
- Discuss the complexity of the issue

- State your position
- State reasons for your position
