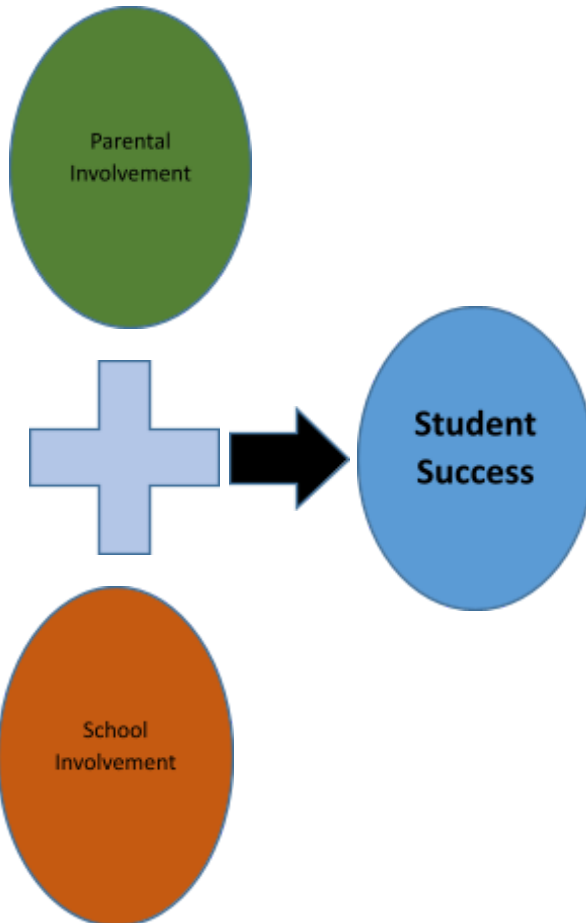


How can you help your child?

What is Title I?

Title I, Part A is one of the many federal programs in the ESSA (Every Student Succeeds Act of 2015). Title I, Part A provides formula grants to districts. Districts then allocate funds to Title I schools based on their number of low-income children. The district must use Title I funds only in schools that have been selected for services through allowable procedures. Funds are used to improve student achievement in high poverty schools.

Title I works to give all children a chance to learn at higher academic standards. Its purpose is to prevent failure by ensuring that more children experience success in school in order to be college and career ready.



What does Title I provide?

Title I provides extra help such as:

- Additional staff to supplement what is already provided by state and local funding
- Additional training for staff
- A variety of instructional strategies and materials
- Funding for Family Nights

Title I programs are developed through the effort of parents, teachers, and administrators. A needs assessment is conducted to determine what change is necessary for all students to meet standards for college and career readiness. Then a plan is developed to meet the needs identified. Goals are established for the district and schools along with strategies and activities to assist in

obtaining these goals. The plan is then implemented, reviewed regularly and evaluated annually to check its effectiveness.

Additionally, 1% of Title I funding received is reserved to assist in parent training, and parent input is accepted to determine training needs.

Who receives Title I funding?

In Trimble County, all schools receive Title I funds and are considered School-Wide Title I schools.

There are several requirements of each Title I school. For example, each school has a parent involvement policy and school-home compact. The purpose of the policy and compact is to build and foster a partnership to help all children achieve the high standards to meet college and career readiness.
