
I Was Born a Baby

Accompanying Activities

1. Science: Organisms and Environments

After reading *I Was Born a Baby*, the librarian will use this <u>Pear Deck</u> in order to help students practice naming baby animals. The students will match animals with their offspring. It is important to point out the similarities and differences between parent and offspring with each example.

2. Language Arts: Response to Vocabulary

After reading *I Was Born a Baby*, students will create a <u>Venn Diagram or Box and T Chart</u> to compare a few animals. This might include comparing two different types of chicks, like a baby chicken and a baby ostrich. Comparing a baby goat (kid) to a small child (kid) would be a great way to notice similarities and differences. Students could choose any two animals from the images on the end pages to compare, such as any two calves or any two cubs.

- **Response Skills:** The student responds to an increasingly challenging variety of sources that are read, heard, or viewed. The student is expected to:
 - Kindergarten TEKS: *ELAR 110.2 (b)* 6 F respond using newly acquired vocabulary as appropriate.
 - First Grade TEKS: *ELAR 110.3 (b)* 7 F respond using newly acquired vocabulary as appropriate.
 - Second Grade TEKS: ELAR 110.4 (b) 7 F respond using newly acquired vocabulary as appropriate.
