Today's Focus: Organizations 1






DAY 2: WEDNESDAY MAY 12

Today's Focus: Problems 1

Tweet 1



Being the first tweet of the thread, I use an all caps header plus emojis to draw attention. This tweet gives general information on the issues, how its conducted by the industry and the impact of captivity on the animals. I also included a picture of how orcas are used for stunt shows to entertain visitors. Tweet number is there to maintain reading order of the thread!



This tweet is dedicated to a concrete list of the negative effects of captivity on orcas. Header is written in all caps to indicate the tweet's subject, and I attach my source for others to see the details behind the health/social issues orcas experience as result of captivity. Links to articles also generate a thumbnail with embedded link in the tweet so visibility is better!



When looking for sources about orca captivity, I encountered this interview in the results and found it perfect as it gives a unique perspective on the issue! Former trainer John Hargrove's position makes him credible to talk about the issue, inform others to change and push others to protest against the establishments that continue these practices. The video being a form of media also generates a thumbnail for visibility.

DAY 3: THURSDAY MAY 13

Today's Focus: Solutions 1




I organized some accessible solutions to stop orca captivity in a three tweet thread. Being the first one, there's a header and emoji for attention purposes and I emphasize that "Money talks" when it comes to bringing attention to these issues.

Tweet 2



In this tweet, I brought up the fact that although on the surface there seems to be legislation "protecting" marine mammals, there's actually finer stipulations. For this, to get attention brought to the issue, I put a link to the USAgov so that people can contact their local officials and tell them to condone marine mammal captivity.



In this last tweet, I also include the organization International Marine Mammal Project's current petition to end cetacean captivity. It also is a petition that condones the Taiji dolphin hunting currently happening in Japan. I know usually people don't want to give money or can't give money, so all 3 of the solutions I've offered in the thread are ones that don't involve something of monetary value.

DAY 4: FRIDAY MAY 14

Today's Focus: Organizations 2



The tweet also has the twitter handle and a picture of their logo so that followers can visit their profile.



In this tweet, I quickly summarize just what CWR is involved with. The header is a question that followers may ask about the organization and in the tweet is a bitly link leading to their mission statement page and a screenshot of the mission page's front image.

Tweet 3

DAY 5: SATURDAY MAY 15

Today's Focus: Problems 2

Tweet 1



With this being the first tweet in the thread, it is given an all caps header with emojis and a subheading to describe the issue I will cover. In the tweet I actually reference one of the organizations I mentioned in the past to cit some critical statistics. I also attach images of a beached orca who died with the following plastics in its body (second image).

Tweet 2



In this tweet, I use another all caps header to indicate that this tweet will discuss a different issue, in the case being about bycatch. In the tweet I also quickly define bycatch and briefly preface what it causes. I also use a recent message from WDC about the issue for viewers to get a glimpse of what happens.



In this tweet, I go into detail of what happens to the animals even if they break free from bycatch. Then, in the tweet I also attached an infographic from a Food and Agriculture Organization of The United Nations that also includes a broad scope of how bycatch affects an entire ecosystem and its inhabitants.

DAY 6: SUNDAY MAY 16

Today's Focus: Solutions 2


Tweet 1



I begin the thread with an all caps header and use "Us VS (Insert Issue)" for the subheaders. 

DAY 7: MONDAY MAY 17

Today's Focus: Infographic



In my infographic, I list out some of the negative impacts orcas suffer from being kept in captivity. For some of the harms, I simply put symbols, but the first two being body deformations/damage I instead used actual images to show viewers what the extent of the damage looks like. The question "What are the harms?" is made in much larger text and in red.

Although orcas are dolphins as well, I wanted to comment about the overlap both share. I also gave a tongue and cheek comment indicated with "/s" as it is sarcasm.

Tweet 3
