# JULIUS CAESAR ASSASSINATION TRIAL SIMULATION

#### 6th Grade Social Studies

Prosecution and Defense Teams (3 on each side): One person will be responsible for an opening statement, telling the jury what you will be proving to them and the closing argument, highlighting why your side should win. One person will be responsible for questioning the first witness and for cross-examining one of the other team's witnesses. The 3rd person will be responsible for questioning the second witness and for cross-examining one of the other team's witnesses. Each witness should be asked a minimum of 5 questions.

**Witnesses (2 on each side):** Each of the four witnesses are responsible for meeting with their team of lawyers and preparing a script of 5-10 questions & answers that help your side. 2 of you will be witnesses for the Prosecution and 2 of you will be witnesses for the defense.

**Jury Members (6-8):** During the few days that we spend researching and getting prepared for the trial, the jury members will be researching a topic related to Ancient Rome. They will be making a short presentation to the class highlighting what they found. During the trial, the jury is responsible for paying close attention to what is said and then doing their best to make a decision based on what was said at trial. They should not make a decision based on any other reason!

Evidence: List all of the information that you believe is important about your topic. This should be in your own words--not copied & pasted!

How did your topic influence or affect Ancient Rome? This question should cover at least a couple of slides of your presentation.
