One of the most important factors in foster retention is whether the fosters feel as if they were adequately trained. Providing fosters with training doesn't need to be time-consuming or logistically complicated. Many organizations are putting it online, where it can be accessed 24 hours a day and/or providing training on-the-spot using a checklist to ensure major concepts are adequately covered. Don't forget to train fosters in marketing their foster pets, how to complete the adoption process, how to run meet and greets and your organization's adoption philosophy, if needed.

### Practices for Increasing Foster Retention

- Welcome and respect volunteers
- Provide fosters with ample training and resources
  - Training should be easy to access, such as online or on-the-spot training
  - Have a central location where fosters can learn more about fostering, such as a foster resource page on your website
- Assign volunteers to tasks that match their skills
  - Ensure that fosters have the support needed to foster the animal they take home
  - Give experienced, trustworthy foster caregivers the opportunity to become foster mentors or help with the program in other ways
- Provide opportunities to share experiences with other volunteers
  - Create a volunteer & foster social media group where they can share stories and get support
  - Consider hosting 'happy hours' or other social events
  - Let volunteers know how they can work as teams to support pets in foster homes
- Support new volunteers
  - Ensure that fosters have adequate support to provide care for the pets they take home
  - Consider training foster mentors that new fosters can call on for advice and support
- Communication
  - Regularly communicate with foster caregivers
  - Respond to questions and inquiries promptly
- Recognize volunteers

- Host a volunteer and foster appreciation event once a year and give out awards
- Post shout-outs on your internal social media page to fosters and volunteers who have gone above and beyond the call of duty
- Thank them in person often
- Solicit feedback about the program once a year or more
