

IWG U.S. Hybrid Worker Sentiment Survey February 2023

To gauge current views and preferences of workers and managers regarding hybrid work, International Work Group commissioned a survey of 1,015 full-time hybrid workers in the U.S. in early February 2023. Respondents were asked a diverse set of questions from the biggest benefits of hybrid work and the value of hybrid work to how work friendships impact their job satisfaction.

- **Workers Would Give Up a Portion of Their Salaries for Hybrid:** Overall, 67% of respondents would be willing to give up some amount of salary to keep their hybrid work arrangement.
- **\$13,000** is the average amount respondents would give up **from their salary** to secure the flexibility of hybrid work, rather than returning to the office five days per week.
- **Nearly a quarter (24%) of those making more than \$150,000** per year would give up **more than \$40,000 per year**.
- **Hybrid Work is a Must-have Job Benefit:** With 45% of respondents saying that they will consider changing jobs if they are asked to return to the office full-time, 61% say they will only consider hybrid roles if they look for a new job.
- **Managers and Employees Agree about Productivity in Hybrid Work:** 65% of all managers believe their employees to be very productive in a hybrid work arrangement and 60% of employees believe their managers think they are very productive in a hybrid work environment. Close to three quarters (72%) say they feel better able to carry out their jobs since adopting hybrid work.
- **Three Work Friends is a Magic Number Contributing to Job Satisfaction:** Nearly half (46%) of hybrid workers believe that friendships play a key factor in choosing to stay at a company. The majority (63%) of hybrid workers surveyed reported that office friendships increase job satisfaction and 46% reported that close friends keep them at their jobs.
- **Social Activities and Connecting with Coworkers in Person Drive Trips to the Office:** More than half (53%) of respondents cite that social activities and seeing co-workers are the biggest drivers of time spent in the office – ahead of learning and development opportunities (43%), office amenities (40%), and impressing managers/bosses (24%).

Survey Data Points

Workers Would Exchange Reduced Salary for Hybrid Work

- Overall, 67% of respondents would be willing to give up some amount of salary to keep their hybrid work arrangement.
- Workers would give up \$13,000 on average in exchange for hybrid work.
- 7% of all respondents would give up more than \$40K annually to keep a hybrid work schedule vs. being fully in-office

- o 10% of all respondents would give up \$30K
- o 16% of all respondents would give up \$10K
- By salary range:
 - o Nearly a quarter (24%) of those making \$150K or more would give up more than \$40K of their salary
 - o 21% of those making \$100-149K would give up \$20K
 - o 16% of those making \$50 – 99K would give up \$5K
- Generational differences:
 - o 22% of Millennials & Gen Z would be willing to give up 31-40% of their salary (0% of Boomers and Gen X would say the same)
 - o 25% of Boomers and 21% of Gen X would give up 1-10% of their salary

Work Friendships & Job Satisfaction

- When asked how many close friends workers have at their company, more than a quarter (27%) said they have 3 close friends while 23% say they have 5 or more
- Amongst all hybrid workers, 63% reported that good work friends increase job satisfaction
 - o Across generations, 70% of Millennials & Gen Z believe that having good work friends improves job satisfaction (vs. only 39% of Boomers and 55% of Gen X)
- Nearly half (46%) of hybrid workers believe that friendships play a key factor in choosing to stay at a company
 - o Across generations, 53% of Millennials & Gen Z believe that work friendships play a key role in choosing to stay at a company (vs. 19% of Boomers and 40% of Gen X)

Hiring & Retention with Hybrid Work

- 45% of respondents indicate they will consider changing jobs if they are asked to return to the office full-time
- 61% of respondents say that if they look for a new job, they will only consider hybrid roles
- 76% of respondents say they perform their job better when they can choose where they work
- 72% of respondents say they feel better able to carry out their job since adopting hybrid work
- Workers Want to Work Closer to Home:
 - o 60% of respondents say they would like their employer to offer a workspace within 15 minutes of their homes and 49% say they would like their employer to offer a workspace within 45 minutes of their homes
- 64% of respondents say there should be more training on working in the hybrid model

Hybrid Work & Productivity

- Among all hybrid work managers, 65% believe that employees are very productive in a hybrid work arrangement with only 5% believing that they are less productive and 30% citing a normal level of productivity. Managers and workers are on the same page as 60% of employees believe their managers think they are more productive now than before the pandemic when they were in the office full-time.
- *Differences by location and type of area:*
 - o Managers in the Midwest have less confidence that their employees are very productive in a hybrid work environment than in other regions (West 74%, Northeast 68%, South 62%, Midwest 53%).
 - o By location type, 78% of urban and 51% of suburban hybrid managers consider their employees to be very productive, with only 45% of rural respondents agreeing.
- *Differences by job level:*
 - o 81% of C-level executives believe that employees are very productive in a hybrid work environment, as do more than 80% of managers making more than \$100K per year
 - Interestingly, this perception of employees being very productive decreases along with seniority:
 - C-Level: 81%
 - Director: 70%
 - Manager: 56%
 - o Nearly 70% of hybrid workers with a salary of more than \$150K believe productivity has increased with hybrid work

Managers are more hands-on in hybrid work:

- The majority (70%) of C-Level respondents have changed their management approach in a hybrid model and they have more regular communication via email, phone or text and 48% have more 1:1 in-person check-ins to discuss career path, job satisfaction and bandwidth.
- Out of all managers, only 15% believe that their management approach has stayed the same as it was before the pandemic.

Survey Methodology

MORTAR RESEARCH: SURVEYING HYBRID WORKERS IN THE U.S.

Mortar Research carried out a survey targeting full-time employed individuals in the US of companies that offer hybrid working. All were incentivized and each provided opt-in consent in line with MRS and GDPR guidelines.

AUDIENCE: Targeting workers in the US working for a company with a hybrid work setup
5,854 Survey Entrants | 1,015 Completed Surveys

GENERATION DEFINITIONS:

- Baby Boomers (age 59 and older)
- Gen X (ages 44-58)
- Millennials (ages 29-43) + Gen Z (ages 18-28)

This survey was taken by a total of more than 1,000 respondents on both mobile and desktop devices. All were based in the U.S. The study ran between February 3 – 7, 2023.

MULTI SOURCED APPROACH: The different recruitment methods used alongside the supplier blend removes any potential single source bias.

QUALITY CONTROL: Measures in place on both a supplier and respondent level. These include Geo IP tracking and digital fingerprint checks to ensure that there is no duplication or link manipulation.

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
