- 2. Set a timer for 10 minutes.
- 3. Write about the topic until the timer ends. Don't use the backspace to erase what you have written. Just keep writing.
- 4. Write the title, and how many words you wrote, and record it on the chart (Tools > Word count)
- 5. Finish
