Slide 5: 1 min	TALKING POINTS Most colleges use a holistic process that considers various aspects of background and experiences—including grades, curriculum, extracurricular activities, work experience, geography, socioeconomic background and life hardships—so that each applicant's unique voice and perspective are fully appreciated. Present yourself in the way that feels most authentic to you; including personal experiences, challenges overcome, and your	
	life goals/ambitions Include any family or employment responsibilities in the	

	extracurricular section of your applications.	
	If you have experienced any life hardships that you WANT to share (you never have to), you can do so! Share what feels authentic to you and your life experience!
